Annable, secretary. —Nomination papers for Clifford Thorne, who aspires to the office of railroad commissioner, were being circulated in Keokuk today. Mr. Thorne is at present chairman of the board of Iowa commissioners and well known in this city. —Julius Rosenwald, president of Sears, Roebuck Co., in a sworn statement says his income is \$1,320,000 a year, or about \$3,600 a day, which causes the Donnellson Review to remark: Most of this money comes from the people of the west, to the detriment of the local stores, as well as to the detriment of the people themselves, for upon the prosperity of your business men rests the prosperity of the whole community. —Everybody who has been out reports that the country roads are in perfect condition and the people in the country, who have an auto, and here are comparatively few who have none, regret the fact that they are so busy that they are unable to get out as often as they would like. —H. S. Payne, who is promoting the interurban railroad between Fort Madison and Keokuk, was in the city yesterday, soliciting funds for the new road. No money subscribed for this road is to be paid until cars are actually in operation over the line. Mr. Payne's proposition looks like a perfectly safe one and it is absolutely certain that the road proposed would be of inestimable value to this city. Karl's, 714 Main. —Remorseless Rainey, says the Donnellson Review, wants to recall the Keokuk dam, as it were. He says the power company have "horns-wegled" St. Louis into a 99 year contract, and that it isn't doing anyone in the Mississippi valley any good. The congressman has another guess coming. If he were below the dam next summer with a ten cent fishing pole and a can of worms, and hauled in the flny denizens of the deep for a few hours, he would realize that the people of this section know a good thing when they see it. The idea of spoiling a good fishing place just for a little \$27,000,000 dam is preposterous. —Phone 84 for a case of Leisy beer when you're out. —Burlington is wrestling with the heating problem. It is one of the few cities having a central heating plant. It appears that the building of the Keokuk dam has had something to do with putting the system on the blink. After reciting a number of trails through which the plant has passed the Hawk-Eye says: Now comes another change in the history of this enterprise. The great water power at Keokuk threatens to wind up the central heating supply business. The electric current from the gigantic dynamos at Keokuk makes the steam power in the Burlington plant no longer necessary, except as a reserve force in case of accident at the power dam or to the transmission lines. No steam power in use here means no exhaust steam, no "by product," and that spells no profit from a central steam supply system. The People's Gas & Electric company is puzzled to know what to do about it. It cannot afford to operate the plant at a loss; on the other hand the company has a large amount of capital invested in the plant. To cease to operate the system would convert long stretches of street mains and connecting pipes into old junk, buried under street paving which ought not to be disturbed. To dig it up would cost more than it is worth. To abandon it is to bury so much capital and cut off a former source of revenue.
