HORSE IS BURNED IN FIRE IN BARN

Early Morning Blaze in Building in Rear of E. H. Loewenstein's Residence Makes Work for the Firemen.

CEMETERY HEDGE ALSO

Is Evident That Incendiary is at Work and Endeavoring to Cover His Tracks.

Fire which was discovered shortly before 1:00 o'clock this morning destroyed the barn in the rear of the residence of E. H. Loewenstein, 1912 Tinea street, and burned a fine horse which was in the barn. The alarm was turned in at 12:55 o'clock. Shortly after 1 o'clock the West Keokuk reel, which had come up to the Sixth street station, was ordered to the scene. The hedge about the cemetery three blocks distant, was found to be burning.

It looked like the fire was of incendiary origin, and that the hedge had been set on fire in the endeavor to draw attention from the barn. The hedge was burned for a distance of only fifty feet.

It was reported first that two horses had been burned in the barn, but firemen who later made an inspection of the ruins, decided only one animal was in the barn. The horse which was burned, was said to be a race horse. A racing sulky and a buggy in the barn, both were consumed. The fact that the wind was in the opposite direction for a spark to fly on to the roof of the barn strengthens the theory that the barn had been set on fire. The burning of the cemetery hedge did not distract the fire fighters from the big fire. The burning hedge could be seen when the department arrived at the scene of the barn fire.

The wind which was high all evening, made the fire rather difficult to handle, and dangerous to the surrounding houses.

CADETS DROWNED IN THE LAKE

Racing Shell Was Swamped in Sudden Gale While Crew Practiced.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] DELAFIELD, Wis., April 18.—Three cadets at St. John's Military Academy here were drowned this afternoon in Lake Kewaukeon, when a sudden squall swamped the racing shell in which the school crew was practicing. The dead: L. H. KELLEY, 19, St. Louis, acting coxswain.

DONALD MOGA, 18, Hinsdale, Ill. FRED SPRUTE, Farmington, Minn. Tired with their efforts in the shell, the boys started for the shore, but only six were able to come within reach of the shore, where they were pulled out unconscious, by Thomas Ruge, a farmer, and a farm hand. Because of the fury of the storm and the coming of darkness, efforts to recover the three bodies were abandoned over night. It is said the accident will kill racing at the academy.

CUTTING SCRAPE BETWEEN NEGROES

Louis Fulton and Scott Johnson, Both Sustain Wounds in the Affray.

Louis Fulton, Scott Johnson and Clay Johnson were the participants in a rather lively cutting scrape which occurred early this morning in Luther Hardin's pool hall and was continued in Mitchell's restaurant. Louis Fulton has a gash in his shoulder and Scott Johnson has a wound in the back of his neck.

Fulton who was at the police station, declares that the Johnsons jumped on him. He claims that he didn't do any cutting but protected himself with his fists. Doctors who attended Johnson, say the wound in his neck could not have been self-inflicted.

Fulton's son, R. Fulton, displayed a cut in the thumb which he said he got trying to wrench the knife away from Johnson. He turned a bloody looking instrument over to Captain Griffey. He claimed that the knife was the one used on his father.

The police were investigating the affray this morning.

\$50,000 Damage Suit. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] MINNESOTA LAKE, Minn., April 18.—Rev. John Holpin, pastor of the local Catholic church and Miss Anna Laurisch were today made defendants in an action for \$50,000 damages brought by Frank Laurisch, a Danville farmer, uncle of one of the defendants, because of alleged kidnaping of plaintiff's ten year old son, Reuben, about two months ago. The grand jury recently declined to indict Father Holpin on the charge of kidnaping because of the insufficiency of the evidence. The boy's father has also started an action for \$50,000 against Wm. Brest and Katie McArdle of this village in connection with the same alleged kidnaping.

Ordered to Appear. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Ill., April 18.—Subpoenas ordering Samuel Insull, receiver in a federal bankruptcy case of the Oak Park elevated railway, and Britton I. Budd, president of the Chicago Elevated Railways Co., to appear before the Illinois public utilities commission April 29 and testify, were issued late today, after attorneys for the railway magnates had defied the commission.

The utilities commission is trying to learn why the Oak Park lines has failed to elevate its tracks through the village of Oak Park. Insull's attorneys contended that as a receiver appointed by the federal court, he was an officer of that court and could not be forced to appear before this state body.
