Receives Letter From Industrial Association Commending Action Taken on Problems.

WORKS FOR SUPPORT

Passes Resolution of Thanks to the Association for Encouragement and Support.

PLAN IS PROPOSED TO BURN GARBAGE

Letters Are Addressed to Two Civic Bodies by Men Vitaly Interested in New Project.

THEY WANT TO BUILD

Cost to Property Owners Would be Only That of Hauling Garbage, It is Said.

A plan to provide a garbage incinerating plant for the city at no cost to the city, and at but nominal cost to the resident who will pay for having his garbage hauled to the plant is the proposition which A. H. Shelley and Elias Brant of Hamilton are making. A letter addressed to the Industrial Association and to the Civic League asks these two bodies for opinions on the proposition as proposed.

The plan of the two men is to furnish an air tight tank in which to haul garbage from the city to the incinerating plant. The purpose of the air tight tank is to protect the inhabitants from any odor which might arise while transporting garbage, it was explained. It is believed by the promoters that flies and other insects will be thus exterminated.

As the matter now stands there is no provision for hauling garbage in any specified tanks. It is expected that the council will be asked to pass such a protecting ordinance if the plan proposed is endorsed by either of the two associations.

It is planned to install a burner at a convenient place, whereby all garbage conveyed from the city can be burned. The burner will be constructed at the expense of the two promoters, it is understood. They are asking only the indorsement of their plan, it is understood.

The old city council was asked to consider the matter of a garbage incinerating plant. It was decided that it would be too expensive a proposition to take up at the present time.

What action the Civic League and the Industrial Association will take in the matter at this time remains to be seen.

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INCREASE MADE IN SALOON TAX

City Council Passes Ordinance Increasing Tax on Saloons From \$1,500 to \$1,800.

TO REDUCE TAX LEVY

Will Make Reduction Amounting to About \$5,500 in Tax Levy Next September.

Plans for the deduction of taxes in this city are taking on definite form in the action taken by the city council today. The members of the council went on record as having the intention of cutting in half the general increase in the tax assessment of 1913 over previous years. The council does not have the power to do this until next spring but wished to go on record now as intending to do so when the proper time comes.

An increase of from \$1,500 to \$1,800 on the tax of saloons in this city was voted on in a resolution passed by the council today. The additional \$300 will go to the city. There are several reasons given by the council for taking this action. They say that the saloons will be given better protection under the present administration, and consequently will do more business. Also they believe that the saloons should bear their proportionate share in the general increase in tax assessments to all property owners.

A reduction in the tax levy in September that will give a reduction of about \$5,500 to the property owners is now planned. The increase in the saloon tax will about cover this amount which would otherwise be lost to the city administration. Members of the council say that they have been urged by many to increase the tax of the saloons to \$2,400. This, however, they believe to be too large. The increase of \$300 will not be objected to, they believe. The saloon tax in many other Iowa cities is this large or larger.
