MADERO'S BROTHER TALKS OF MEXICO

Kinsman of Slain Ruler Who is in School at Ames, Says Huerta Does Not Represent Mexicans.

TAKES WILSON'S VIEWS

Only Problem is Whether Country Will Unite, Agriculture Student Declares in an Interview.

"I sincerely hope that the people of the United States will continue in the wisdom of seeing that de facto Mexico—that is, the great, popular masses of the Mexican people," says Carlos Madero, brother of the murdered president, who is a student at Ames, Iowa, college.

"The United States knows, and appreciates, that Huerta doesn't give a 'continental' for the people of Mexico. The welfare of Mexico does not interest him an infinitesimal fraction as much as he is in holding to his illegal position. I believe that Huerta would resort to any means, patriotic or not, to keep the place of power he occupies."

Two of Madero's brothers—Paul and Julio—are officers in the rebel army. Paul was with Villa at the battle and fall of Torreón, where he was wounded and his mount shot from under him. He had been with Villa since the rout of the federals at Ojinaga. The brother Julio is on the general staff of Gen. Carranza, the constitutionalist president and commander in chief of the rebel forces.

He thinks the blockade of Huerta's ports will cause the fall of the dictator in a short while. "If Huerta's ports are blockaded, Huerta may be down in two or three weeks. At any rate, he can not last long. If the United States does not interfere with constitutionalist operations Carranza will be in Mexico City by the end of summer," says Madero.

Constitutionalists Friendly.

"The constitutionalists are for Mexico for they stand for the principles the great mass of the Mexican people have been fighting for. If constitutionalist Mexico is invaded, I am inclined to look for war, and in case of war I have no idea what will happen as to a possible coalition of the constitutionalists and Huerta. But I do not believe there will be any war as far as the constitutionalists are concerned. I do not think that if intervention of the United States comes that the United States would do anything to antagonize the constitutionalists. But should the United States send an invading force through constitutionalist territory Carranza and Villa might go to war against this country."

Could Muster 500,000 Men.

He says the main problem in Mexico is whether the whole country will stand behind Huerta. In event of an invasion of the United States in all the country, he would predict a united Mexico against the United States. In that case Mexico could recruit and put in the field against an invading army a force of 500,000 men, Madero says.

"As long as the constitutionalists think it fit to keep out of the affair of Huerta and the United States I shall do the same, but when they take an active part I, like every other Mexican, would feel it my duty to go with them," said Carlos.

"There are now two probabilities as regards Huerta, it seems to me. He may yield, and he may not yield. I think not. By the way Huerta has been acting up to now, and by the fact that in Mexico City they say that the American flag was not flying on the lighter when the marines were arrested at Tampico, I think he is not inclined to yield. band, he may yield when he sees the full strength of the United States—too many battleships in front of his wharves, in other words."

Turns Incident to Advantage.

He said he does not know what would be the fate of the foreigners in federal portions of the country if war between him and the United States should break out.

"Huerta had two reasons for refusing to salute the American colors at Tampico, as I see Huerta. First he wanted a return salute from the United States warships, if he saluted the American flag, with the purpose to construe such a return salute as a recognition by the United States of his government. Second, he refused to incur the displeasure of the United States and take advantage of the anti-American opportunity to make himself a popular idol," concluded Madero.

TROOPS MOVING TOWARD MEXICO

Fort Leavenworth Will be Entirely Denuded of Soldiers By End of the Week.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] LEAVENWORTH, Kans., April 27.—Within a week, perhaps less, Fort Leavenworth will be totally denuded of troops for the first time since the Spanish-American war. Yesterday afternoon two companies, B and H, of the signal corps left on a special train for Texas. Transportation already has been arranged for Company A, signal corps and the second squadron of the 15th cavalry, both of which will join the first army division when it is mobilized, which the officers here believe will be soon. Company H signal corps is under orders to proceed as rapidly as possible to Vera Cruz. Company B goes to Fort Sam Houston, Texas where it will receive recruits and be transformed into a field telegraph company. It probably will be assigned to duty with the forces now along the border, with headquarters at El Paso. The officers at the army service schools here are expecting orders to join their regiments immediately after the forced graduation exercises are held Tuesday.

MAY SEND SOLDIERS TO COLORADO MINES

Strikers and Mine Guards Continue to Fire at Each Other in Trouble Zone.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] DENVER, Colo., April 27.—General John C. Chase, adjutant general and 269 militiamen early today were en route from Ludlow to the Chandler mine near Canon City where mine guards and strikers fought all of Sunday. According to a statement by Chase, the strikers have broken the truce which was declared last Friday night and that he can now move his troops to suppress lawlessness. He will not attempt to send soldiers to Trinidad, he says, unless disorder should occur there of sufficient importance to warrant such action. Meantime the eyes of all Colorado are on Washington. Dispatches from there said the president and secretary of war conferred Saturday regarding the Colorado situation and made tentative plans to send United States troops in response to the ap-

peal sent Saturday night by Governor E. M. Ammons. Twenty Pueblo men left that city Sunday for a point near Florence, in Fremont county, Colorado, to inspect a mine supposed to contain radium ore. Near Florence five men suddenly emerged from a hut at the side of the machine was fired on from various points in the hills, about 500 shots being discharged. Gilbert Murray, J. Schmidt and J. Lehead were wounded, none seriously. The men say the assailants were strikers waiting in the hills to attack mine guards. One of the most dramatic mass meetings in Colorado history was held here yesterday when 5,000 men and women gathered in the rain on the state house lawn and adopted resolutions denouncing the militiamen who participated in the Ludlow massacre. The resolutions "branded" Governor Ammons and Lieutenant Governor Fitzgerald as "traitors to the people and accessories to the murder of babies" and called upon the legislature to impeach both "as false to their oaths and to their God." The principal address was made by George Shey of New York.

CALL IS EXTENDED TO REV. BEARDSLEY

Congregationalists Tender Charge to Kansas City Man who Has Preached Here.

The members of the First Congregational church yesterday extended a call to the Rev. Frank G. Beardsley of Kansas City. Dr. Beardsley has occupied the pulpit of the local church for two Sundays and a majority of the congregation present yesterday voted to extend a call to him. The call is to be considered at the convenience of the Kansas City preacher, but a definite answer is expected this week.

Dr. Beardsley has been occupying the pulpit of the First church at Kansas City. He is an Iowan, having lived at Salem and was educated in this state. Dr. Beardsley is considered a fluent pulpit orator.
