## OLD RESIDENT DIED THIS MORNING

Thomas Connelly Passed Away at His Home at 609 Bank Street.

## WAS BORN IN IRELAND

Assisted in Building the Government Canal Here and Was a Prominent Contractor.

Thomas Connelly, one of the old and well known residents of Keokuk, died at the home of his granddaughter, Mrs. H. F. Goodwin, 609 Bank street, at 6:30 o'clock this morning, after a protracted suffering from cancer.

Mr. Connelly was born in the town of Capas, County Limerick, Ireland, in 1831, and came to this country with his parents when about nine years of age, in 1840, the family locating near Chicago when that city was in an embryonic state. During his life he has said that his father could have bought the grounds upon which stands the union depot in that city for a few dollars.

In 1868 he came to Keokuk, which has since been his home, where he was employed later in assisting in building the government canal here, being a superintendent in the quarry work for that important enterprise. For years he was engaged in quarry work here and a contractor in stone work on the streets of the city. During the Hubinger control of the street car lines, Mr. Connelly did much work for the lines and Mr. Hubinger trusted his work and judgment above all others in his line.

He was a steadfast and faithful member of St. Peter's Catholic church, prompt and sincere in the performance of every christian duty. He was well known in all parts of the city and had many warm friends who will regret to hear that his long and useful life is ended.

In 1865 he was married at Memphis, Tenn., to Mrs. Katharine Croncy, who had formerly resided in Keokuk, removing from here to Memphis, where her first husband died. Mrs. Connelly died at her home in this city about seven years ago, in 1907.

Mr. Connelly is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Mary Stahl, of this city, and five sisters, Mrs. William Stahl of Keokuk, Mrs. William Brown of Waterloo, Iowa, Mrs. Margaret Boach of Manchester, Iowa, Mrs. Bridget Flynn of Butte, Mont., Mrs. of Sioux City, and Mrs. Cassidy, Marshalltown.

Funeral arrangements have not definitely been made, as word is awaited from out of town relatives.

## REAL WAR NEWS FROM COLORADO

(Continued from page 1.)

mines, large groups of men were visible maneuvering closer to McNally where they poured in a terrific fire on the mine guards defending the property. Then an automobile shot out of the camp at racing speed, the strikers firing repeatedly at it. In it was Superintendent Thomas Davis and his family. At the first physician's house the machine stopped and it was then seen that Maggie Gregory, a cousin of the superintendent, who had been visiting him, was wounded. She was taken into the doctor's house and her wound in the left arm treated.

As soon as Davis passed safely, a dozen mine guards ran from the boarding house towards a banked ditch towards Walsenburg. Just as they reached it, one man was seen to whirl and fall. His companions did not stop, but leaped into the ditch and began firing.

A few minutes later six men ran from the hills towards several mine buildings and the boarding house was soon in flames. The fire quickly spread to the bunk house and at dark most of the camp buildings were burning. A horseman just at this time dashed from the camp, making for the shelter of some pine trees. He had nearly reached them when he pitched from his horse to the ground, shot. Evidently the man had fled from a terrific explosion which followed almost immediately, wrecking the tippie.

It was shortly after this that the mine guards retreated towards the Walsenburg mine, firing as they ran.

## Three Hundred Dead.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Federal troops will in all probability be enroute to the Colorado coal strike zone before tonight. President Wilson took up with Secretary of War Garrison, before the cabinet meeting today, the advisability of granting Governor Ammons' request and utilizing the regular army to end the admittedly intolerable conditions. The house committee on mines and mining has agreed that only the presence of regulars who will compel both sides to disarm, will end the campaign of bloodshed which has already claimed some 300 victims, many of them defenseless women and children. It is understood that orders were sent to the commanding officers at Fort D. A. Russell, Cheyenne, Wyo., to hold four troops of cavalry ready to start for Trinidad. He has also been directed to secure necessary transportation at once.

The dispatch of the troops will be the answer of the administration to the refusal of John D. Rockefeller to make a single concession to end the intolerable industrial warfare.

Some of the mines are expected to shut down indefinitely after the regular troops get there. Just which will do so, or the reason, no one here knows. The orders to be given to the regulars will be one of the subjects under discussion today. They will not work under the Colorado local authorities. It has been directly charged that the real cause for the present trouble is that in nearly every instance, sheriffs of counties and commanding officers of state troops are in the pay of the coal companies and have obeyed the orders of the general managers of the various mines to exterminate the strikers. If this is so, it will be all changed

when the regulars get on the job. They will be told that the law is to be obeyed on both sides and that they can and must arrest all law breakers whether mine operators or strikers. They will also be told to shoot to kill if they have to shoot.

After conferring with the president for half an hour, Secretary Garrison returned to the war department.

"We have not yet reached a definite decision on the question of sending federal troops to Colorado," he said. "I am to see President Wilson on the subject again in a very short time."

President Wilson also conferred with Representative Foster, prior to the cabinet meeting and it was announced that the whole question of sending troops had been referred to the cabinet session today. On their decision will rest the sending of federal forces into Colorado.

## Shipment of Ammunition.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 28.—Two large shipments of ammunition from Charleston, W. Va., to the Colorado strike zone have been made within the last four days, according to reports here today. One machine gun was sent on Monday, it was said.

The first shipment was made on Saturday by the Cabin Creek Consolidated Coal company, it was said, to "H. Felts," at Trinidad, and consisted of five cases of cartridges for use in Winchester rifles, or about 18,000 rounds. That was followed on Monday, according to the report, by the shipment of one machine gun and 15,500 rounds consigned to "H. K. Rhodes." The machine gun is supposed to be the property of the Baldwin-Felts detective agency and is said to have been used against the West Virginia miners on the death special which swept Holly Grove.

## Using Machine Guns.

TRINIDAD, Colo., April 28.—Telephonic advices from Walsenburg today state that 200 state militiamen reached there early today and mounted a machine gun on the ridge, west of that place, sweeping the McNally mine with their fire. T. M. Hudson, clerk of the district court at Walsenburg also asserts that the militia and mine guards at the Walsenburg mine had a machine gun trained on that city of Walsenburg itself and that firing continued into the city streets from midnight on Monday. Reports here of fatalities vary. One is that five strikers and three mine guards have been slain. Hudson says the miners were killed during the morning, either in Walsenburg itself or just outside. He asserts that one miner was struck by a bullet and killed while he was standing in the Seventh street depot, far from the scene of fighting. United Mine Workers officials here have advices that fifty militiamen this morning, attacked the McNally mine which was attacked yesterday and repulsed. Most intense excitement prevails throughout the whole southern Colorado strike field and it is impossible to get any confirmation of reports. Wires, both telephone and telegraph, have been cut in all directions.

nor E. M. Ammons today issued a call for volunteers for the state militia and simultaneously declared Boulder county in the northern Colorado coal fields under martial law. He also ordered one hundred troops from Canon City to Boulder county to restore order there. The soldiers left Canon City by special train. The governor said Sheriff Buster and a force of deputies and mine guards are cornered in the Hecla mine and are in danger of extermination. The fighting at Walsenburg last night and the sending of troops to Boulder county, has effectively shattered the truce which was declared last Friday night.
