COWBOYS FALL IN FAST GAME 10-4

Superb Twirling By McCollough Holds Visitors Helpless While Tribe Pounds McCoy Hard.

INDIAN STOCK JUMPS

Local Club Looks Stronger Than Ever as Contenders for Central Association Reg.

While McCollough was holding the Burlington Pathfinders to five hits, the Indians fell on McCoy's offerings for fourteen, winning by a score of 10 to 4, the game played in this city Friday afternoon, with a fair-sized crowd of fans looking on. But nineteen men faced the Indian pitcher in the first six innings, seven of these fanning the ozone, and the rest with one exception, went out on easy chances. That one exception was Singleton, the visitors' heavy hitting left fielder who beat out a bunt.

It was a great victory for the tribe, and settled for all time the question of whether or not they are strong enough to be pennant contenders in the C. A. race. If Burlington wins the rag this year they will have to beat the Indians to it. For Abb's men looked just as good in all departments as did any of the Manush visitors.

Giffin Starts Things.

The tribe opened the scoring in the third when Giffin singled and scored on McCollough's triple through Lunte. Hensling failed to connect but Abb's sacrifice fly scored Mack. McCollough's heavy slugging brought Giffin in for another count in the next period. "Athletic" walked and scored on Mack's long double.

Things were quiet from then on until the sixth when Red Gottschall opened a batting rally that counted three runs by cracking out a long triple to right. Giffin walked again and started to steal second a few minutes later, running leisurely. Rolleg fell for the play, throwing to second when Red steamed for home and a run, drawing a throw from Harmon before Giffin had been retired but too late to stop Red from scoring. Giffin scored a second later on McCollough's single. Hensling doubled, scoring Mack. Abb poled a long one that nearly reached the club house. It looked, however, like an easy out to Strong. Strong stepped in a hole, however, just as he was about to grab the rain-getter. Abb reached second on the hit, but Whitey got no farther than third.

Add Four in Eighth.

The tribe added four more in the eighth. Giffin starting the ascension of McCoy by strolling for the third time. Mack singled, advancing him to third, and both scored on Hensling's two-bagger. Rogerson drove the shortfielder in with a single and coasted himself on Sweet's safe catch. In four trips to the plate Giffin registered one single and walked three times. McCollough did even better, driving out a triple, a double and two singles in four times up.

The visitors got their first tally in the seventh on an error by Jack and singles by Singleton and Manush. It was the first sign of weakening McCollough showed and forecasted what came in the next when the Cowboys smacked three times more. Rolleg advanced to getting safe on a boot by Gottschall. The next two men died easy chances. Jack to Abbott. Rolleg advanced a base on each out and scored when Singleton connected on one sack. Mack gave a life to the next two that faced him and slipped to Manush that the former Indian had. George's only hit scored Manush, the last visitor to get past McCoy.

With perfect support McCollough would have let Hayden's club down without a count. In both the seventh and eighth, when the Cowboys made their runs, the first man to get a life was safe on an error and two batters were retired before a score was made. Despite the fact that fourteen hits were made off McCoy he looked like a good twirler. Manush figures him as one of his best, which leads the Indians to hope he will be able to take his regular turn on the slab when the Cowboys come here this summer.
