**PARENT-TEACHERS MEETING TUESDAY**

Will be Held at High School at 3 O'clock and Those From Each District Are Invited.

**ALDRICH IS TO SPEAK**

Necessity for Playgrounds Will be His Subject—Kind of Play, Dr. Christensen's Topic.

The necessity for public playgrounds and healthful and harmful play will be discussed by speakers at the parent-teachers' association meeting tomorrow afternoon at the high school auditorium. Parents from all of the districts in the city are invited to attend the meeting which will be an open one. The meeting will commence at 3:00 o'clock.

The program for the afternoon is in the hands of Mrs. O. W. Weyer, and she announced today that Superintendent William Aldrich would speak on the "Necessity for Playgrounds." Superintendent Aldrich will be leader of the meeting. Following his talk will come one by Dr. C. J. Christensen on the topic, "Some Healthful and Some Injurious Play."

Following both of these speakers there will be discussions led by various speakers. These discussions will aim to cover certain points brought out by the speakers and enlarge on them if possible, or to bring out other points.

The near approach of the end of the school year, and its consequent hegra of teachers makes it so that there will probably be no action taken tomorrow towards the establishment of district associations, for the present. These will be taken up next fall, however, when the school work is taken up again, and the teachers will be in the city to confer with the parents.

There have been a number of parent teachers meetings held during the year, and this is one of the several of general meetings which has been held.

The meeting tomorrow afternoon is open to parents in every district, and a large attendance is being urged by those in charge of the meeting. The gathering will have much of importance to impart to the parents, and a large attendance is asked. Invitations are being sent out through the schools of each district and through the press for this meeting tomorrow.

The Greater Iowa committee which is soliciting funds from commercial and industrial associations in the state for the proposed Iowa building at the Panama Pacific exposition will arrive here tonight in their special train from Des Moines. The committee made stops today at Ottumwa and Oskaloosa. From Keokuk they will go to Burlington and other cities along the river.

A telegram was received this morning by O. B. Towne from Ralph Bolton, secretary of the greater Des Moines committee, in which an invitation was extended to twenty-five of Keokuk's leading citizens to meet with the committee at the Hotel Iowa tonight at dinner as the guests of this body. In his telegram Mr. Bolton said the committee wanted to meet Keokuk people and get acquainted.

Dinner will be served at 7 o'clock at the hotel. There will probably be about forty present, as there are about fifteen members of the committee which is endeavoring to raise funds for the financing of the project. The agitation for an Iowa building at San Francisco was started by Waterloo. The work of financing the proposition is in the hands of a committee appointed by the governor at a meeting held in the senate chamber of the state house. The Greater Des Moines committee is active in the work of pushing the project.

Just what action Keokuk or the industrial association will take in this matter is a matter of some moment to the local people in view of the fact that every nerve is being strained to push the work here, and that there is a big financial strain on the various members of the association, the local people may not care to make any subscription to this project.

The committee is coming in a special train which left Des Moines early this morning. Two hours was allotted for the stop at Oskaloosa and a like length of stop was made in Ottumwa. The members will stay here until some time early in the morning when the trip will be resumed over the Burlington route.
