



—Gilbert Lee of Fort Madison, candidate on the republican ticket for the office of auditor, was in the city yesterday. He is well known in Lee county having made the race for representative three different times. Mr. Lee asks the support of the republicans at the primary election.

—The following report by the secretary of the Iowa State Horticultural society shows the average condition of fruit on May 1st: Apples, 58 per cent; pears, 78; American plums, 85; European plums, 76; cherries, 90; peaches, 69; grapes, 90; red raspberries, 74; black raspberries, 75; blackberries, 82; currants, 87; gooseberries, 83; strawberries, 78 per cent of perfect condition. The average condition of all fruits is 78 per cent, or 7 1/2 per cent less than in April.

—Burlington is coming to the U. C. T. convention to be held in this city in force. At the last meeting of Burlington council No. 393, a large attendance of the members was present and two candidates were initiated. Burlington will be well represented at the Iowa grand council meeting to be held at Keokuk June 4, 5 and 6, the local organization having planned on going there June 5. A brass band will accompany the Burlington delegation, and the latter will be attired in natty uniforms.
