Nebraska Wins Honors by Grabbing Relay Race and Five Points.

LINCOLN, Neb., May 16.—By the score of 62 points to 55, Nebraska University defeated Minnesota this afternoon, the victory being in doubt to the end and depending upon the winning of the relay race. Three World Records for Female Broken and a New One Established by College Girls.

## FRESHMEN CARRY MEET

Lake Erie College Freshmen Carry Away Meet With Classmates Yesterday Afternoon.

PAINESVILLE, Ohio, May 16.—Three world's records for female athletic events were broken and a new one established by girls of Lake Erie college in their annual track meet this afternoon.  
The records: 40 yard hurdle, 6:35 seconds; Miss Jeanette Hunter.  
60 yard hurdle, 10:15 seconds; Miss Jeanette Hunter.  
90 yard hurdle, 13:35 seconds; Selma Peterson.  
Discus throw, 54 feet, 7 inches; Miss Marion Connolly.

The previous world's records in the forty yard hurdle were established in 1912 by Miss Hunter in seven seconds. The sixty yard hurdle record was established by Charlotte Shaw of Lake Erie in 9:45 last year. The ninety yard hurdle record was established by Marie Thompson in fourteen seconds here in 1910. The discus throw was unrecorded, being a new event in female athletics.  
The Lake Erie girls failed to lower records in the sprints. These are held by Vassar and Bryn Mawr girls. Freshmen carried off the annual track meet with 118 1/2 points against the juniors 34 1/2; seniors 21 1/2; sophomores 18.

## DAVENPORT CAPTURES STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Wins State Interscholastic Track and Field Meet by Taking First in Last Event.
