## WILL ENTERTAIN MISSOURI PEOPLE

Mississippi River Power Company  
Will be Hosts to Public Util-  
ities Convention Here  
Friday.

### ARE COMING ON QUINCY

Trip Over the Dam, Baseball Game  
and Dinner Are All in the  
Program for the  
Day.

The Missouri Electric, Gas, Street  
Railway and Water Works association  
will be the guests of the Mississippi  
River Power company here on Friday.  
The public utilities association will  
arrive here on the steamer Quincy  
which has been chartered for the oc-  
casion. The convention opened today  
in St. Louis. Sessions will be held  
going and coming on the boat.

There will be 250 persons including  
state officers of Missouri, city officers  
of St. Louis, Governor Major of Mis-  
souri is to be a member of the party.  
If illness in his family will not pre-  
vent his attendance. It is understood  
that his mother is ill, and he may not  
make the trip. Mayor Kiel of St. Louis  
and public utilities commissioner  
will be on the boat, however.

The boat is scheduled to arrive at  
noon at the Keokuk wharf, J. A. Tra-  
wick, manager of the Mississippi River  
Power company, Mayor S. W. Moor-  
head, and Councilmen Collins  
and Schmidt will board the boat at  
the landing, and the Quincy will then  
go through the lock into the forebay,  
and the excursionists will embark at the  
sswall at the lower end of the fore-  
bay.

The trip over the plant of the Mis-  
sissippi River Power company will then  
be made and will consume two hours.  
From the dam the party will go up  
the Fulton street steps to a special  
train of street cars which will be  
waiting at Fourth and Fulton streets,  
and which will take the party to the  
ball game. The members of the party  
who do not care to go to the game  
and women in the party will be taken  
on a sight-seeing tour of the city  
in automobiles.

At 6 o'clock dinner will be served  
the visitors as guests of the power  
company. One hundred and twenty-  
five will be accommodated at the  
Hotel Iowa and a like number will be  
served at the Elks club. Following  
the dinner there will be a short pro-  
gram of after dinner speeches and a  
cabaret brought along by the Mis-  
souri excursionists. The guests at  
the Elks club section will go over to  
the Hotel Iowa to hear the postprandial  
program if they desire.

At nine o'clock the Missouri excu-  
sionists will give a dancing party on  
board the Quincy with the Mississippi  
River Power company people and  
some of the Keokuk people as their  
guests.

The Quincy will leave at midnight  
for St. Louis.

The guests on this trip will be given  
bronze medallions showing the dam  
and power house. These will be the  
gift of the industrial association.

## CHOOSE DELEGATES AT JUNE PRIMARY

Republican Voters Urged to Not Forget to Vote for Allotted Number in Precinct or Township.

### WILL FILL VACANCIES

County Convention Will Complete Ticket—Must Vote for Committee Member, Also Township Officers.

Any vacancies which appear in the republican county ticket after the primary on June 1, will be filled by the county convention which will be called shortly after the primary by Chairman George W. Mattern. It is probable that there will be two vacancies in the county ticket, as there seem to be no republicans who filed nomination papers for these offices at the time for such papers to be filed. The delegates to the county convention will select candidates for these vacancies.

It is very important that the voters bear in mind that they should vote at the primary for a member of the republican central committee and delegates to represent their precinct or ward as the case may be. The manner of voting for these delegates and central committee member is usually that of writing the name on the ballot or stickers, the color of the ballot will be furnished, and the voter will paste these to his ticket in the proper blank.

The townships and precincts in Lee county are entitled to vote for the following number of delegates, according to the figures given out this morning by George W. Mattern of this Donnellson, chairman of the central committee:

Another important feature for the voters in the townships outside of the town in the county to remember, is that where no township officers have been named, the voters shall write names of candidates in the proper places on the ballot. This applies to the offices of the township not included in the boundary lines of a town.

The primary election will be held June 1. This will be on Monday. Delegates and members of the committee who are chosen then, serve for two years. The law does not recognize alternates, so there is only one list to elect.
