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BURLINGTON HERE TOMORROW FOR SERIES

MANUSCHERS WIN SECOND GAME 4-1

Pitchers' Battle Goes to McCabe Who Received Better Support From His Team-mates.

THE GAME IS PROTESTED

Indian Boss, Canned to Bench, Makes Formal Protest Following Decision of Umpire Murray.

[Special to The Gate City.] BURLINGTON, Iowa, May 20.—Burlington started out on another winning streak yesterday by beating the Keokuk club by a four to one count. Tim McCabe was on the mound for the locals and struck out fourteen of the Indian batsmen. Every one of them was a victim of his wiles with the single exception of Clarence Jack. Bill Whittaker was pitching for the visitors and his work could hardly have been bettered. The hits were four each and neither of the hurlers was touched for an earned run. The batters of Bill were almost the fools that McCabe's seemed to be and the Red Sox were at his mercy from the first going.

Abbott Protests Game.

The game was won under protest from Manager Abbott of the Keokuks. The grievance was claimed when Whittaker fanned in the eighth. Abbott claims that the third strike was low and that it hit the ground after Whittaker had tried to slam the ball and that Rolleg did not make a catch of the ball but that he in reality scooped it off the dirt. Abbott had already been chased off the field by Murray for protesting on the decisions of the ump on balls and strikes. The arbiter did not hesitate one little minute and refused to argue. He merely indicated that Abbott was canned from the game and for him to take his seat on the bench.

Manager Benched.

There was a prospect for some excitement for a time but the Keokuk manager soon calmed down and the rumpus was ended. Murray was accused by Abbott of missing some easy ones and when Abbott took it on himself to tell him, it aroused the necessary amount of decision and the order was given. The expulsion from the game automatically assessed a fine of five dollars.

The game yesterday started the same as have many others since the season has been in swing. The visitors managed to go out in one, two, three or the first half and when the Manushers came up there was nothing to overcome. Meinerst slammed one to Hensling who booted long enough to allow the runner to be called safe. Lowther rapped out a good clean single and advanced the runner to third. Singleton hit into a double play, but Meinerst came home with the count.

McCabe in Fine Form.

McCabe worked like a charm the entire game and the lone tally secured off him came in the sixth frame. The count was made almost exactly the same as the first score of the locals. Hensling, the lead off man, hit one to Lunte who copped. He went to second on Jack's infield out.

Giffin singled and the one run was across the pan. Gottschall was struck out and Donovan went out, Harmon to McGlade.

The one count was the sum total of the efforts of the Keokuk players and they were not dangerous at any other stage of the game. They got men on the sacks in some of the other innings, but fast double plays and the superb pitching of McCabe held them helpless.

Score Three in Third.

The Manushers scored three runs in the third on one hit. McCabe started the frame by flying out to Jack. Meinerst laid one down the third base line and beat it out. Lowther struck out and Meinerst was safe at second when he tried to steal and Hensling dropped the throw from Sweet. Singleton walked and Harmon hit one, the first that Donovan tried to field, and threw away, letting Meinerst score and Singleton and Harmon advance to third and second respectively. McGlade hit a high one to center that Herring dropped and Harmon and Singleton scored. Strong ended the inning by fanning out.

It was one, two, three for the locals from that frame until the seventh when Rolleg connected with one for a single but was allowed to die while his team mates were going out. McGlade doubled in the eighth after two were down but could not score as Strong hit an easy pop that Hensling copped.

Best Game of Season.

The game was the best that has been played here this season and the fans were in a frenzy of excitement from the start to the finish. McCabe won an everlasting home with them by his good work and they were generous enough to give Bill Whittaker full credit for the good work he did. Abbott played Pennington, a newly acquired outfielder in the game. The new man did not have a chance in the field and succumbed each time he came to bat with the single exception of once when he walked.

The contest was a comparatively fast one.

QUIMET LOSES IN GOLF TOURNEY

Young American Open Champion Eliminated in His Second Round by Tubbs of Littleton.

ONLY TWO ARE LEFT

"Chick" Evans and Harold Weber Were Only Two Americans Left in Tourney Today.

SANDWICH, England, May 20.—"Chick" Evans, Chicago, and Harold Weber of Toledo, Ohio, were the only Americans left in the British amateur golf championship here today. The decisive defeat of Quimet by Tubbs threw a damper over the Americans which was only partly dispelled a few moments later by Herreshoff's victory over J. R. Platt. Weber's defeat of K. M. Carlisle and Evans' worsting of Scott offset the defeat of Arthur G. Lockwood and Quimet.

Frederick Herreshoff of New York was defeated one up, leaving but two Americans, Evans and Weber. Francis Quimet, United States open golf champion was eliminated from the golf tourney today in his second round when he went to defeat before Tubbs of Littleton. Tubbs won, two up.

This left only four Americans in the running: Frederick Herreshoff of New York, "Chick" Evans of Chicago, Harold Weber, Toledo, and Arthur G. Lockwood of Massachusetts. Frederick Herreshoff's offset Quimet's defeat by batting four up and three to play. The score of the Quimet-Tubbs match:

Throughout the championship play, Quimet's play has been very disappointing and he did not at any time come up to promise of his former work and the expectation of the Americans. Another American was eliminated from the championship, leaving only three when in the third round Arthur G. Lockwood, Massachusetts, was defeated by Hayward, two up and one to play.

Evans, American, defeated Scott of Park Langley, three up and two to play.

Harold Weber defeated Carlisle, seven up and six to play.
