-Ferndell jams at Immebart's. -Choice fresh cat fish at Jos. Hauer's, 709 Main street. -Limburger cheese at Renard's grocery, Tenth and Main streets. -J. M. Meredith is slowly recovering from a severe attack of malaria fever. -The season is right for the straw hat and a number have made their appearance. -The steamer St. Paul will bring an excursion into Keokuk next Sunday from Burlington. -J. P. Kennedy of Montrose was in the city yesterday transacting business and visiting his friends. -A number of members of the local Moose order went to Fort Madison today to take in the carnival. -Quincy papers are enthusiastic about the Plymouth oil fields, more so than many of the Plymouth people. -The fishing season began in Iowa a few days ago and there seems to be some fish, judging from the number of men who go fishing. -Regular meeting of Keokuk Lodge, No. 106, B. P. O. E., tonight at 8 o'clock, Elks' hall, Sixth and Blondeau streets. Visitors invited. -Regular meeting of Pucketchuck encampment No. 7, I. O. O. F. at Odd Fellows hall at 8 o'clock tonight. Visiting brethren fraternally invited to attend. -The members of Torrence Relief Corps will meet with Mrs. Elmer Stowe, 416 Concert street, on Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock to attend memorial service at St. John's Episcopal church. -Ferndell chili sauce. Immebart's. -The Quincy and Burlington papers report the arrival of steamers each day from Keokuk "bringing in a large list of passengers." Why wouldn't it be a good idea to have some boats run into Keokuk and bring in a large passenger list instead of taking people away from Keokuk? -Secretary of State Allen has issued a warning to counties of the state that the publication clause of the state primary laws must be observed this week at the latest. The law provides that notices containing the list of the offices that are to be filled must be published two successive weeks before primary. -Since the street oiling proposition was not taken up this year, owing to the lack of co-operation on the part of property owners, dusty streets all over the city are reported. The slightest wind on some of the streets on the north side sends a big cloud of dust up the streets to the discomfort of pedestrians and housekeepers. -The Morning Star, which passed through here yesterday, will make a trip from Davenport to St. Louis and back at the time of the Pageant and Masque celebration to be given in St. Louis May 28, 29, 30, and 31. The boat will stop here on the trip down on the morning of May 27. It will reach St. Louis on the morning of May 28 and will leave there on the morning of May 30. -Warnings to fishermen will be posted in conspicuous places in Price's Creek, Sandusky, and in practically all of the bayous along this side of the river in the jurisdiction of Deputy Warden Reichman. These warnings quote Section thirteen of the fish and game law and tell how large a fish of what species may be taken from the waters by which the notice is posted. A fine of \$5 for each fish that is not of lawful size is the penalty attached. -The advertisement appearing in last evening's issue of The Gate City from the Keokuk Electric Co. issuing a warning for children to look out for the cars is timely. This is the season when the children play in the streets and where the car lines run this is a dangerous practice. It is only another reason why playgrounds should be provided. Inasmuch as playground room here is conspicuous for its absence, the warning by the car company is timely and should be heeded. -The Gate City is in receipt of a copy of the Northland-Post published at Cochrane, Greater Ontario, compliments of T. J. Manley, formerly of this city. He posted a letter by same mail in which he says snow was falling when he sent the letter. Mr. Manley goes 195 miles north of Cochrane for a short stay. He expects to return to the states so that he can spend the Fourth of July either in Chicago or Keokuk and his Keokuk friends hope this city will be his choice. Enroute home he intends to stop at Quebec to see Fred Merchant, another Keokuk water power man. James McCarthy and George Kepner are with Mr. Manley.

GRAND LODGE MEETS HERE NEXT AUGUST

Colored Societies will Hold Joint Session in This City This Summer.

The joint session of the Grand Lodge of United Brothers of Friendship and Society of the Mysterious Ten will be held in Keokuk some time in August. This is the lodge of colored people which embraces Missouri, Kansas, Iowa and Nebraska in its jurisdiction. The probable date of the opening of the convention is between August 15 and August 18, according to the Rev. T. H. Phillips through whose efforts the grand lodge was secured for Keokuk. Rev. Phillips stated this morning that he was expecting between 900 and 1,200 delegates would be here for the convention. Friday of convention week will be the big day, he said, and the largest crowd of all would be here then. It is possible that the sessions of the grand lodge will be held at Kilbourn's park. Rev. Phillips is making arrangements for the meeting, but no definite meeting place has yet been decided upon. There will be some public meetings of the lodge, and on Friday there will be a big parade.

SANTA FE ROAD FILES ITS PAPERS

For the First Time Since Reorganization it is Legally Authorized to Do Business in Iowa.

For the first time since the company's reorganization at Topeka in 1895, the Santa Fe railroad is legally authorized to do business in the state of Iowa. The company also enjoys for the first time in the Hawkeye state the right of eminent domain, although it has exercised it many times heretofore because it had been generally understood by Iowa citizens that the company had the same powers as have the other roads operating in the state. The company Tuesday filed a certified copy of its articles of incorporation in the office of the secretary of state, having been delinquent since 1895. This is the last one of the interstate railroad companies doing business in Iowa to file in this state. The company paid the state \$2,162 in filing fees.
