HARRY RALSTON ENDS OWN LIFE

Well Known Insurance Man of This City Found Dead by His Wife Yesterday Afternoon.

NO REASON FOR ACTION

Was Born and Reared in This City and Had Been in Business Here for Last Two Years.

Harry Hill Ralston, 42 years old, a well known insurance man of this city, ended his own life some time yesterday afternoon at his own home, 1121 Blondeau, by drinking the contents of a two ounce bottle of carbolic acid. He was not discovered until after 8 o'clock last evening, when his wife went home from his office where she had been waiting for him to return and take her home. So far, no notes of explanation left by him have been discovered, and no reason for his action is known. He was in good health and good spirits. According to the story told by his wife, he had left her at his office at 700 Main street, at 1:30 yesterday afternoon, while he went out to do some collecting. She was to remain there until he returned. When he left he kissed her good bye, saying that he would be back before long. He seemed to be in the best of spirits.

Bought Carbolic Acid. Shortly after 2 o'clock, he went into Englehardt's drug store at Ninth and Main, and purchased a two ounce bottle of carbolic acid, signing for it. Evidently he went at once from there to his home. No one saw him enter the house, and no one was in the house at the time. It is believed that he drank the acid soon after he entered the house, for the doctors stated on their arrival last evening that he had been dead for several hours.

His wife waited for him at the office until 6:15 last evening. Then she went home, finding him at once lying on the bed in the front room upstairs. He had taken off his shoes, coat and shirt. The bottle, almost empty, was found on the floor at the side of the bed. His wife ran out of the house, screaming and crying. A number of neighbors, attracted by her cries, came at once. Dr. F. B. Dorsey, Jr., was called and he made an examination of the body, stating that Ralston had been dead for two or three hours.

Born in Keokuk. The deceased was born and reared in this city, and had been engaged in business here or in this community the greater part of his life. He entered the insurance business here in January of 1912. For two years and a half previous to that time he had been managing a large department store at Lincoln, Neb. For twenty years he was the manager of a branch store of the Duncan-Schell company, at Carthage.

He was married February 8, 1897, to Miss Carrie K. Kellmer of this city. They had no children. The only immediate relatives surviving besides his wife, is his mother, Mrs. Mary Ralston, and his brother, Roland R. Ralston, who live together at 517 High street. Both he and his wife were members of the Congregational church, while he was a thirty-second degree Mason. The funeral will be held at the house tomorrow afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. Rev. George C. Williams of Newton, Iowa, who was until recently pastor of his church, will preach the funeral.

FOUR YOUNG OTTERS KILLED ON DRIVE

ARE URGING DAWSON TO ENTER PRIMARY

Missouri Friends Want Local Attorney to Go After Toga Worn by Senator Stone.

Missouri friends of Attorney John M. Dawson are urging him to make the senatorial race against William J. Stone, the present holder of the toga. Mr. Dawson told a Gate City reporter this morning that he had the matter under advisement, and would make a decision in due time.

Mr. Dawson was former assistant attorney general of Missouri. He was a resident of Kahoka, before coming to Keokuk. If he decided to run against Senator Stone he will enter the democratic primaries. Mr. Dawson will have to decide shortly as to his future movements in the political field for the reason that June 5 is the last day for filing in Missouri. The primaries are to be held the first Tuesday in August.

If Mr. Dawson comes out in the race for United States senator he will find Judge William M. Wallace of Kansas City already in the field. Judge Wallace expects to file his declaration during this week.

"My friends are advising me to enter the race," said Mr. Dawson this morning. "However, I have that matter under advisement and will make my decision later."

CHARGES ARE MADE AGAINST JURYMEN

Attorney for Zugg Asks New Trial, Alleging That Members of Panel Drank Intoxicants During Trial.

ALSO TALKED OF CASE

Defendant Asks That Members Be Put on Oath and Made to Answer as to Their Actions.

Claiming that members of the jury in the case of the state against J. M. Zugg drank intoxicating liquors and discussed the merits of the case contrary to their oaths, and also that the court erred in giving certain instructions, the attorney for Zugg today filed motion for new trial. In his motion, Attorney Frank M. Ballinger asks that the jury be brought into court and made to answer to the facts he alleges as regards drinking and discussion of the case.

Zugg was indicted on the charge of having illegally sold liquor. He is charged with having liquor in his restaurant on the levee. The jury returned a verdict of guilty last week, after a two day trial, and recommended leniency for Zugg. Zugg has been out on bonds until yesterday, when a bench warrant was issued for his arrest, as it is understood his bondsman asked to be released.

There are nine paragraphs to the motion for new trial. Paragraph 7 states that "the verdict should be set aside because members of the jury drank intoxicating liquors during the trial." In paragraph 8, it is charged that "certain members of the jury publicly discussed during the trial, the evidence offered." It is also charged that the jury returned a verdict contrary to the facts, and the verdict was based on passion and prejudice.

The defendant asks that "the jury and each member be brought into court to answer to the facts of his having drunk intoxicating liquors during the progress of said cause, as to his having discussed the merits thereof during trial, and that they be required to answer under oath in a oral examination as to their doings and sayings." The instruction given by the court that the finding of liquor in a restaurant was presumptive evidence that it was there for sale is attacked in the motion. Other instructions by the court are attacked as being in error.

TO HEAR EVIDENCE IN K. & W. ACTION

People Endeavoring to Force Sale of Road Will Have Hearing Shortly.

Within thirty days the United States department of justice will fix a date for the Iowa attorneys to present their evidence in the movement to compel the Burlington route to sell the K. & W. branch, running from Keokuk to Shenandoah, charging that the road is violating the Sherman anti-trust law. Earl Ferguson of Shenandoah, who with Herbert Scott, is representing the cities along the K. & W. branch, has received the assurance of the government that the matter will be pushed in the courts if the evidence is sufficient.

The people along the K. & W. branch feel confident that if the Burlington is compelled to sell the branch, it will be purchased by the Union Pacific as a connecting link between its lines now ending at Omaha, and the B. & O., now ending at Beardstown, Ill. Ferguson declares this would be of immense advantage to the southern part of the state and will give the towns along the line the service they are entitled to. The Burlington is claimed to own four lines which parallel each other in southern Iowa.

The people interested in the K. & W. branch say they are interested only in divorcing it from the main system. However it is probable that if the government takes up the matter, it will be for the purpose of making the Burlington sell all but one of the lines it now owns in that territory.
