TOO MUCH BILL BEATS PILOTS 6-1

Indians Make It Three in a Row From Hough's Crowd at Clinton Yesterday.

THEY HIT THAT BALL

Few Extra Bases Made by Tribe Off Their Eight Safe Singles of the Game.

[Special to The Gate City.] CLINTON, June 1.—A mixture of too much Whittaker, Keokuk horse shoes, Clinton "Jinx" and Umpire Kennedy resulted in Clinton's defeat Sunday, 6 to 1, by Keokuk before a crowd of about 1,500. The principal ingredient in the mixture, however, was Clinton's inability to hit Whittaker safely, especially when a pinch hit was needed. Umpire Kennedy made himself such a persona non grata with the crowd that it would not even listen to the usual ninth inning announcement of the Monday program. The crowd seemed to think his judgment poor, although on Saturday his decisions were as bad for one team as for the other.

Smithson Jerked. Smithson, who started the hurling for Clinton, was jerked at the end of the fourth inning when Boss Hough of the Pilots became convinced that his star hurler was not in condition. Smithson was more or less wild. Burg, who succeeded him, pitched a good game, but the Keokuk Indians were having a field day of safe hits and lucky breaks. Whittaker was like a stone wall after the first inning and Clinton could only hit the ball for little infield pop-ups or liners that always landed in the mit of a fielder. Things had a rosy hue for the Clinton fans when Nolt, the first man up in the first inning, singled and reached home on a stolen base, sacrifice and an error by Gottschall. But after that it was almost one, two-three for the Pilots. Hubbard opened the seventh with a three-bagger, but his comrades were unable to send him home.

Indians Score in Second. Keokuk scored in the second when, with two down, Gottschall was walked and Giffin hit for three bags. Giffin, himself, however, was unable to score. In the fourth, three Indians patterned over the pan. Caffyn, first up, was hit and stole second. Abbott whiffed. Gottschall walked and Giffin hit his second three-sacker, scoring on Sweet's sacrifice fly. Whittaker hit for two bags but Jack struck out. In the seventh, Whittaker opened the pot with a single and Jack followed suit. Brennan went down on an infield out, but Hensling's three base drive scored Whittaker and Jack. DAWSON'S CONDITION PUZZLES DOCTORS

Speedway Pilot Suffering with Internal Injuries—Physicians are Hopeful, They Say.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 1.—"We are hopeful" was as much as physicians at the Methodist hospital would say today regarding the condition of Joe Dawson, driver of the Marmion racer, who risked his life and sacrificed possible laurels in Saturday's Speedway race to save the life of Ray Gilhooly, lying on the track before him. Dawson's condition is critical and is puzzling the doctors. They are unable to learn the extent of his internal injuries, which are in the region of the kidneys.

Dawson's external injuries were slight. A broken collar bone and slight bruises were their extent.

Ray Gilhooly, who was only slightly injured will be out of the hospital soon. Nina Bonani, his aids, was not critically injured. The others injured will be released soon.

BAR MEETING IN BURLINGTON

State Convention is to be Held June 25-26 With Harvard Professor Present.

IOWA CITY, Iowa, June 1.—Great interest is being manifested all over the state, both by lawyers and laymen, in the coming meeting of the State Bar association at Burlington June 25 to 26th. This is the 20th annual meeting and there has been secured as the principal speaker of the occasion, Prof. Roscoe Pound of Harvard law school who will speak upon the subject of "Judicial Office in the United States." Professor Pound is without doubt the leader in advanced thought in the legal profession in the United States at the present time. He is not a radical reformer but through scholarly work he has shown the way in pointing out the present marked tendency on the part of the courts in their changing attitude toward the relation of the courts and the lawyers to the public. This new point of view has been spoken of as the socialization of the law in that we are beginning to look more and more to the rights of society as the end of justice, rather than the extreme consideration of the individual as was the tendency of the courts during the last century.

The president's address is to be given by F. F. Dawley of Cedar Rapids and there will be discussions of such subjects as the disbarment of attorneys, the selection of jurors and other subjects which are of vital interest not only to the profession but also to the public.

The arrangements for the meeting are in charge of E. C. Horack of Iowa City who for the past few years has been secretary of the association.
