Mutual Tornado Association Figures Shows Smaller Amount This Year.

Losses from windstorms have not yet reached the enormous figures of a year ago, says the Des Moines Capital. The losses last year for the Iowa Mutual Tornado Insurance association alone amounted to \$190,000.

## German Coffee Cake

Made Without Yeast. By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine.

There is no warm bread quite as appropriate for Sunday morning breakfast as German Coffee Cake, yet it is seldom made by housewives who do not bake their own bread.

marked that as he was giving the graduating address every year he needed the versatility of a newspaperman or the genius of an inventor to say something new each time. He then related the story of a reporter who said to Prof. Bell, the famous inventor, "Were it not for the press, your inventions would not be known to the world at large." "That's so," replied Prof. Bell, "but do you know that I look upon newspapermen as the greatest invention in the world." Father Gillingger contended that he was neither Prof. Bell nor a newspaperman, not even a word-painter, and would simply give the graduates a few words of advice.

## Must Have Religion.

"No life can possibly be complete with religion left out, and no key can unravel all the mysteries of life if it hear not the genuine religious trade-mark. Prominent educators realize this more and more every day. Before and above the duty of man to man comes his duty to almighty God. Religion, learning and patriotism go hand in hand, and are the only solid bulwark of a government for the people and by the people.

"Catholics are sometimes blamed for having their own parochial schools," said Father Gillingger. "The parochial school was not founded in opposition to the public school but with a view of bringing the child closer to almighty God and keeping it from agnosticism or atheism. The public school under present conditions does the best it can as it has not the right to teach religion.

"I have found the public school authorities of Keokuk a fair-minded body of men. Speaking for my own school, there is a friendly rivalry but no opposition to any school."
