RESIGNATION READ BY REV. R. W. LILLEY

Popular Pastor of First Christian Church Asks Congregation to Sever Connections Existing at This Time.

EXPRESS MUCH REGRET

Pastor Has Chautauqua Season Before Him and Other Work in View at Present.

The resignation of the Rev. Robert W. Lilley as pastor of the First Christian church was presented yesterday morning following the regular church services. Rev. Lilley has asked that his resignation become effective on August first.

The congregation has taken no action on the resignation of their pastor. It is probable that as he wishes to leave at this time they will accept the communication and release him from his obligation. Rev. Lilley has been pastor of the church here for five years and he has become greatly endeared to his people during his pastorate and there will be many regrets at his departure. Rev. Lilley came to Keokuk five years ago from Corydon. He has been quite prominent in the church life of the community, and has taken a wide interest in all that goes to benefit not only the people of his church but of the entire community. He has been a leading figure in some reform agitations and he has been something more than just a spectator in some of the civic movements. Last fall Rev. Mr. Lilley asked his congregation to consider his leaving, but his church protested against his going at that time and requested that he withdraw his resignation. He consented then to remain for a period longer.

Rev. Lilley goes into chautauqua work the first of July and he would in consequence be absent from his church during two months of the summer period. He planned to present his resignation this summer. It came as a surprise yesterday, however, to his congregation. Regrets at the departure of their pastor are being expressed by the people of the First Christian church. They dislike to see their very able leader go, but are not selfish enough to keep him from something better. Rev. Lilley will be missed from this city where he has been a power in the community.

Bloodhounds Put on Trail and Tracked Man to an Old Shanty. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, June 15.—Edward Hastings, 58, of Watervliet, N. Y., who was arrested in San Francisco on the charge of abducting eighteen year old Hazeldeil Knapp of Chicago, leaped from a train four miles north of North Platte, Nebr., but was recaptured, according to detectives who returned to Chicago with him today. Bloodhounds, they said, tracked Hastings to a shanty where he was rearrested. Hastings has a wife and two children in New York. The Knapp girl, whom he is alleged to have induced to accompany him to San Francisco on May 15, has returned to Chicago.
