CITY COUNCIL PASSES ORDINANCE

Ordinance Relating to Taxes on Persons Selling Alcoholic Liquors Passed This Morning.

The city council today passed the general ordinance relating to taxes upon certain persons engaged in the business of dealing in alcoholic liquors at retail, wholesale, for medicinal and other purposes, and the taxing of property in which such business is carried on.

The council also passed another ordinance providing for the opening of Grand avenue through the Wolcott-Bluff addition for use as a street. It is understood that there is no demand for travel on this street at the place mentioned, but that the street was opened up to allow the electric company to extend poles and wires to the Country Club through the addition, they having the right of way to the club beyond the addition.

ANOTHER THEATRE HAS BEEN SECURED

Baker-Dodge Company Acquire Galesburg House and Will Operate it on Same Basis as Grand.

CIRCUIT BEING PLANNED

Company Will Buy Other Play Houses in This Territory, It is Being Planned Now.

The Baker-Dodge Amusement company has completed negotiations whereby they have leased the Auditorium theater at Galesburg, Ill. This is the same company which operates the Grand at Keokuk and the newly acquired Auditorium will be put on the same basis as the local theatre.

C. H. Dodge and Walter West, members of the company, will go to Galesburg tomorrow to begin extensive repairs on the house and will have it ready for an opening about July 1. The latest equipment for the display of motion pictures will be installed, and the house will be re-arranged for a first class combination theater such as is the Grand here.

The same policy as that pursued at Keokuk will be applied at Galesburg. The house will show the latest motion pictures during the summer season, and whenever other attractions are not billed in the regular season, motion pictures will be shown.

The newly acquired Galesburg theatre was run as the Grand was several years ago, dark one-half of the time. In the future only the best of the regular attractions will be booked both at this house and the local house for the coming theatrical season, and when these attractions are not holding forth, movies will be the order of things.

Walter West will be the local manager at Galesburg. The main office of the Baker-Dodge company will continue to be at Keokuk. Mr. Dodge said this morning that the company expects to add other theatres to the houses already controlled by the company and operate a circuit of theatres in this territory.

AMERICAN VOLCANO MAY GET WORSE

People Living in the Vicinity of Mount Lassen, are Moving Away.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] REDDING, Calif., June 16.—Fearing a widespread disaster as the result of an eruption of Mount Lassen, the American volcano settlers in the territory of the mountain are leaving by scores today.

Observers of the two outbreaks of Sunday differ on the question of whether fire spouted from the main crater. A majority declare the eruptions were confined to steam, ashes, pumice and boulders. The last eruption took place last night but was not violent. Subsequent rumblings, however, indicated more outbreaks are coming.
