—The Iowa weather crop bulletin for the week ending June 14, has just been issued as follows: The conditions during the past week were unusually favorable for the growth of vegetation. The average temperature was about 8 degrees above the normal, and all parts of the state received copious to heavy rains. Most too much rain has fallen in the northern and western districts, and as a result field work has been delayed and small grain is getting too rank. However, in the south central and southeastern districts, where droughty conditions have prevailed during the past month, the rains will be of great help to all crops except hay, which will be light. Corn has made phenomenal growth and, in some localities, will average knee high. Oats are heading in all sections, and in the southern counties are filling well, although the straw will be short. In the northern and western counties some oats were lodged even before they began heading. Much clover and alfalfa hay was put up during the week.
