LAST "OPEN HOUSE" FOR POWER PLANT

Company will Admit Without Passes on Tuesday from 2 to 4 O'clock.

The world's greatest water power development here will open its gates to the public next Tuesday, June 23, for probably the last time this year. Between 2 and 4 o'clock that afternoon the public over sixteen years of age will be admitted freely and allowed to wander all over the immense works from the dry dock and lock to the top of the dam. Children under sixteen years old are not admitted under any circumstances.

This is the third time this year that open house has been kept by the Mississippi River Power company, and probably it will be the last opportunity of this kind given in 1914. A great deal of work and managing is required to admit visitors to the big plant while it is in operation, so that the company is compromising between its desire to be hospitable and accommodating to the visiting public and its necessities of operation.

LACK OF POWER ON SATURDAY EXPLAINED

Power Company Official in Burlington Says Cables Blew Up and Caused It.

Burlington Hawk-Eye: That the "blowing up" of the cables carrying electric current across the river for transmission to Burlington, last Saturday afternoon, was not only the first time there has been any lightning trouble on the lines coming to Burlington but a remarkable phenomenon, is stated by the Mississippi River Water Power people.

The bolt struck on top the dam about one-third of the way over from the Iowa end. A party of visitors to the plant say that they saw a big ball of electric fire playing around the lamp posts on the dam there, but whether it was St. Elmo's fire or just a plain, big lightning bolt is not known certainly. Dr. G. Walter Barr, in town yesterday, told about it as follows:

"The bolt went down into the trench in the concrete in which the lead covered cables lie, and both these coming to Burlington literally exploded. The lead cylinder, two inches in diameter was burst out as if by a piece of dynamite, and the copper conductors inside it were destroyed. Both cables went, the one carrying the current and the one in reserve to use in just such accidents.

"This was at 12:35 o'clock in the afternoon. Previously there had been no trouble on the transmission line, except momentary influences from lightning nearby, and Fort Madison on the same line as Burlington had no trouble, except the forcing out of protective switches, which were replaced in each case at once. These lightning influences occur on transmission lines constantly, exactly as they make telephone bells ring, but protective devices at stations prevent stopping operations, as telephones are not knocked out by the same influences. This thunderbolt that hit the cables in the dam this afternoon, is the first time the lines of the Mississippi River Power company have been put out of commission, and the size of the thunderbolt makes us hope that Jupiter has done his worst and it will not occur again for a century or two."
