**GOOD ROADS TALK SENT TO BANKERS**

Address Delivered by Editor Morris at Clinton Convention is Mailed.

P. W. Hall, secretary of the Iowa Bankers' association, is sending printed copies of the address on "The Banker and Good Roads," delivered by D. W. Norris, Jr., editor of the Marshalltown Times-Republican, at the convention in Clinton, to all the members of the association today. great value in supervising the food supply. It will also give the commission control of interstate shipments of food.

W. B. Barney, commissioner, was given authority to represent the federal commission, and J. R. Chittick, state chemist, was appointed collaborating chemist for the United States department.

One of the important results of the increased power is that the shipment of bad eggs in and out of the state will be checked. Formerly the inspectors had no authority over interstate shipments.
