

# JAYS TAKE BOTH IN DOUBLE BILL

First Game of Yesterday's Matinee Goes 6-3 While Second Goes Ten Rounds, 4 to 3.

## SOUTHPAWS EFFECTIVE

Blodgett and Blenner Hold Local Batters Under Their Thumbs—Wahl Hit Hard.

Two battles of Waterloo were staged at the ball park yesterday. The greedy Jays took both from the tribe, one battle lasting ten innings. The first game was dropped by a 6 to 3 score and the second on a count of 4 to 3. The tribe had hard luck on several occasions, losing the breaks when the breaks might have won the game, but at that they were out-played in the critical moments of both games. Over a thousand people saw the twin bill.

Doc Andrews sent in two left handers against the tribe, and both were effective. Lefty Blodgett worked in the first game, opposing Bl. Edward Wahl, Abbott's choice for the opening fray. Edward started out like a world-beater and continued the pace for three rounds. He might as well have thrown up the sponge in the fourth, however, for in that little period the visitors took a single, a double, and a home run, good for four runs from the afore-mentioned Edward. Ed tried hard to make up for this slip and succeeded very well in all but the sixth when another single, double and home run were recorded.

### Tribe Rallys in Ninth.

After the first inning the tribe found Blodgett a puzzle until the ninth when a desperate rally netted two safe blows good for as many scores. Abbott sent in McCollough to bat for Wahl in the ninth, Mack opening the inning with a single, and scoring a minute later with Jack when the old home run getter biffed the pill over the left field wall. Hensling, Dall, and Abbott, the latter batting for Caffyn, went down in order.

The second game was closer and better than the first, the question of ownership being undecided until the last man was down in the tenth. Blenner, another of Doc's southpaws, opened the game against the Indians and proved even more effective than had Blodgett. Blenner was ousted in the sixth to allow Evans to bat when the sacks were crowded and it looked as though the Jays might be able to sew up the game. Old Tommy Drohan worked the rest of the way and did a good job of it. McCollough went the full route for the tribe. Mack did fine until the tenth when two safe blows, coupled with a sacrifice, allowed Drohan to cross the plate with the score that won.

To the batting of Sheldon, Jay first sacker, may be attributed the loss of both games. Tex lined out three home runs and a single, and registered a walk and a sacrifice during the two games. Clarence Jack was credited with two home runs, two singles and two stolen bases in the afternoon's work.

## HAL CHASE BUSY DODGING SHERIFFS

Whisked Away in an Auto From the Fed Park in Chicago Yesterday—Not at Hotel.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, June 22.—Hal Chase, jumper de luxe, will be busy dodging deputy sheriffs for several weeks according to Owner Comiskey of the White Sox who today announced that he will take action at once in every Fed city to prevent Chase from playing with the Buf-Feds. Following his unexpected appearance at the Fed league park yesterday in a Buffalo uniform, Chase was whisked away in an auto and today was not at his hotel. It was reported that he left for Buffalo last night, the Buffalo owners fearing to play him in today's game and risk the appearance of a deputy sheriff with a summons though they realize his value as a drawing card.

Though Chase's jump to the third league was reported one week ago, Owner Comiskey said today he was much surprised that the first sacker should make the move before the expiration of ten days after serving Comiskey with ten days notice. Comiskey planned to seek a court order against Chase in the Cook county courts today.

## JOHNSON'S TRAINERS ARE AFRAID OF HIM

Condition of Big Black Various Reported But is Doing Heavy Training Stunts.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] PARIS, June 22.—If Jack Johnson whips Frank Moran he can probably take all the credit for getting into condition, fight fans agreed. The reason they said was that Johnson has a bunch of French trainers, whose fighting is "a turkish bath tango or standing massage." They are afraid of him, and confine their efforts to running and gymnastics chiefly. Moran reported today "plenty of work and absolutely no worry." Johnson's condition is variously reported, but most of the fans agree he is working off his punch and doing a heavy training stunt. They believe however that rumors of dissipation may tell on the black giant and that

Moran may whip him if he can stand off Johnson for ten rounds.

## INJUNCTION SOUGHT AGAINST MARSANS

Case Taken Before Federal Court at St. Paul as Marans is An Alien.

LOUIS, Mo., June 22.—Armando Marsans, against whom the Cincinnati baseball club asks an injunction to prevent his playing with any team other than the Reds, will know today whether he will be permitted to continue as a member of the local "outlaws." Marsans, being an alien, the case was taken to the federal court at St. Paul, Presiding Judge Sanborn being at present in that city. Marsans will not appear in court, but his testimony will be given in affidavit form.

## YACHTS WILL RESUME TUNING UP CONTEST

Defender Candidates will Hold First Race Off Greenwich Tomorrow Afternoon.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, June 22.—Tuning up contests will be resumed on Long Island Sound this week by the three cup yachts, Defiance, Resolute and Vanitie. The first race will be held off Greenwich tomorrow under the auspices of the Indian Harbor Yacht club. Thursday the trio will race again in connection with the annual regatta of the New York Yacht club. On Friday and Saturday the Zewanoke Corinthian Yacht club will hold races off Oyster Bay for Commodore Harold Vanderbilt's cup. Next week the sound trials will close and after an overhauling the three cup yachts will go to Newport for the actual elimination tests.

## TRANS-ATLANTIC FLYER CHRISTENED

Light Trials to be Made Today—Will Carry Passenger and but Little Gasoline.

## HUMILIATED COB TO JUMP TO FEDERALS

Premier Sluggo Secluded in His Home, Refuses to Receive Visitors or Talk.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] DETROIT, Mich., June 22.—Reports that Tyrus Raymond Cobb, humiliated by the publicity that attended his Saturday night escapade when he is alleged to have threatened W. D. Carpenter, meat shop proprietor with a revolver and later engaged in a fist fight with the butcher's boy, would sever his connection with the Detroit Tigers and jump to the Federal league could not be confirmed here today. The premier slugger today was secluded in his home here, refusing to receive visitors or talk by telephone. Officials of the Detroit club apparently were not worried over the rumor, both President Navin and Manager Jennings denying that there was a possibility that Cobb would jump. It was believed here today, however, that it would be at least ten days or two weeks before the truth of the rumor finally can be determined. It will require that length of time for Cobb's broken thumb, injured in his fight with the butcher boy to heal, and any announcement will be withheld until he is ready to get into the game.

Wetzel is just starting out in the professional baseball field, having played a few games in the latter part of the season last year with the Champaign club of the I-M league. His batting during that time was around the .300 mark.

Pitcher Red Barber has been taken back on the club, replacing Pitcher Dawson who was released today before the club went on the road. Dawson did not get in any of the games. Barber was with the club for a few days, and pitched a total of three innings. He had all kinds of stuff but lacked control at the time he was on the Indian roster.

REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION  
Official Call for the State Convention to be Held at Des Moines, July 15, 1914.  
To the Republican Electors of Iowa: By direction of the republican state central committee of Iowa a delegate convention of the republicans of Iowa will be held in the city of Des Moines, Wednesday, July 15, 1914, at 11:00 o'clock a. m. In accordance with Section 1087-a27 of the Supplement to the Code, 1907, as amended by Section 16, Chapter 69, Acts of the Thirty-third General Assembly, the duties of this convention shall be: To formulate and adopt a state platform for the republican party. To nominate candidates for the party for any state office to be filled by voters of the entire state when no candidate for such office has been nominated at the preceding primary, and for which office there were persons voted for at said primary. To elect a state central committee, and to transact such other business as may be properly brought before it. At 10 o'clock a. m. of the day of the aforesaid state convention, the delegates from the several congressional districts shall meet in caucuses to transact such business as may properly come before them and select the usual committees of the state convention. The basis of representation is said state convention shall be as follows: One delegate for each county and one additional delegate for each two hundred votes, or fraction thereof not less than 100, cast for George W. Clarke for governor at the general election held November 5, 1912. The counties from the First district of Iowa will be entitled to send the following delegates: Des Moines ..... 14 Henry ..... 10 Jefferson ..... 9 Lee ..... 14 Louisa ..... 8 Van Buren ..... 8 Washington ..... 10 L.
