—Picnic parties are being planned for the glorious Fourth next Saturday. The day will be a holiday for practically everyone, and auto trips and picnics are being planned in consequence.

—A large number of Keokukians went to Fort Madison Saturday to attend the political conventions. Those who made the trip by automobile were impressed with the splendid conditions of the crops.

—It is not likely that the lawyers' picnic will be held until after the jury cases have been disposed of. This annual outing of the barristers from Keokuk, Fort Madison and Montrose is always a big event in court circles.

—Elvaston, Ill., will celebrate the Fourth of July next Saturday with a community picnic in a grove a mile south of Elvaston. The success of the Elvaston outing last year has inspired the promoters to duplicate the affair this year.

—Mrs. E. Wilmes, 1706 Bank street fractured her left hip Friday. Mrs. Wilmes who has reached the age of 98 years, had the misfortune to break her right hip two years ago. She has been removed to the residence of H. J. Bonham, her son-in-law.

—Fire escapes are being placed on a number of Keokuk buildings to conform to the state law. An inspector has been in this city recently and notified a number of property owners to make changes in their buildings to meet the requirements of the law.

—With two days left of the fiscal year, the number of marriage licenses issued from June 30, 1913 to June 27, 1914, was 356. The number issued during the last fiscal year had this bested by about ten. The number for June this year was 32. Last year's June brides' list was considerably larger.

—The interest in a world's championship prize fight is astonishing. The Gate City telephone was ringing almost continuously for a few hours Saturday evening and information sought as to "who won the fight?" Calls were sent in from Hamilton, Warsaw, Montrose and other points.

—The Warsaw items in a contemporary paper contains the following pertinent inquiry: It is hoped to hold the Sunday School picnic in the park on Wednesday. —Fourth of July falls on Saturday this year and will be generally observed. It is a legal holiday throughout the United States. Business in Keokuk will be generally suspended. The various offices of the city will be closed during the day, and it is probable that the stores will close a part of the day. While no general public celebration has been scheduled there will be the time honored celebration by the small boy.

—A count of the mail handled at the Hamilton, Ill., post office is being kept, and the following report is found in the Hamilton Press: During the 32 days of counting, there were 1,248 parcels mailed at the Hamilton office, and of this number 1,206 were mailed at the main office, while but 42 were mailed on the two rural routes. Of the number of parcels delivered, but 321 were sent out on the routes, while 1,127 were delivered from the post office direct. The rural route mail collected during the two months amounted to 2,220 pieces, and of this number 2,216 were first class, while but 104 pieces of all other classes were collected.
