## KENDRICK NAMED BY REPUBLICANS

Local Man Will be Candidate for County Attorney and W. H. Clements Will Run for Coroner.

## HARMONY IN MEETING

Delegates Meet Yesterday at Fort Madison and Plan for Campaign This Fall.

## WORK OF LEE REPUBLICANS.

W. R. C. Kendrick of Keokuk nominated by acclamation for the office of county attorney.

Walter H. Clements of Fort Madison nominated for coroner over E. E. Hawkes of Keokuk and George S. Ferguson of Keokuk.

Delegates were chosen to republicans state convention at Des Moines July 15.

Ed. S. Lofton of Keokuk unanimously elected to place on congressional committee to succeed John C. Scott, retiring member.

The republicans of Lee county held their convention in the court house at Fort Madison yesterday morning. They chose candidates for the office of county attorney and coroner which were left vacant by the June primary. W. R. C. Kendrick of Keokuk was the unanimous choice for county attorney.

When it came to nominating a candidate for coroner a spirited fight was on. There were three candidates in the field. Walter H. Clements of Fort Madison was opposed by E. E. Hawkes and George S. Ferguson, both of Keokuk. When it came to voting, Clements received all of the Fort Madison delegation's vote, one solid ward in Keokuk and the majority of the coun-

try. He was declared to have a majority and was elected.

Ed. S. Lofton of Keokuk was chosen as a member of the congressional committee to succeed John C. Scott. Mr. Scott nominated G. W. Mattern of Donnellson, and Mr. Mattern placed before the house the name of J. P. Kennedy. It was then that Edward G. Vaughn of Keokuk placed in nomination Ed. S. Lofton. The other two candidates withdrew and Mr. Lofton was the unanimous choice of the assemblage.

Minutes of Meeting. The minutes of the meeting yesterday show the following work accomplished by the republicans in convention:

The meeting was called to order by County Chairman G. W. Mattern of Donnellson, who read the official call. On motion W. G. Blood of Keokuk was named chairman of the meeting. On motion C. F. Skirvin of Keokuk and Thos. P. Hollowell of Fort Madison were named secretaries. The roll of the delegates was called.

## Kendrick is Choice.

Harrie R. Collins of Keokuk, with a neat introductory speech, placed in nomination the name of W. R. C. Kendrick for attorney. Fred Overton seconded the nomination and it was made unanimous by acclamation.

## Fight for Coroner.

For candidate for county coroner R. N. Johnson nominated E. E. Hawkes of Keokuk, seconded by Glen Cochran of Des Moines township; E. A. French of Keokuk nominated Geo. S. Ferguson of Keokuk; R. A. Gardner of Fort Madison nominated W. H. Clements of Fort Madison, seconded by H. W. Bengston of Denmark township. The poll of the townships was taken and W. H. Clements was declared the nominee, the vote standing: Clements, 39; Hawkes, 26; Ferguson, 11.

Kennedy of Montrose and Ed. Vaughn of Keokuk nominated Ed. S. Lofton of Keokuk. The first two named withdrawing in favor of the last, Mr. Lofton's election was made unanimous.

by his big arms. At this stage, neither of the men seemed seriously hurt. Despite the blows handed, there had been nothing approaching a knock down and the old rumors of "fixed fight" were revived at the ring-side. The two were sparring in the center when the bell rang, Johnson's round.

ROUND 17—Wrestling tactics started the round. Moran rushed time after time, swinging wildly, but at each attempt, Johnson caught his forearms before a blow could land. They struggled all over the ring and murmurs of disapproval sounded all over the velodrom. Moran so far had showed nothing to cause Johnson to worry. The round was half over before a real blow was struck. Johnson's round.

ROUND 18—From all over the house came a chorus of "boos" as the fighters came to the center. They still wrestled. Not a blow of note was struck, stalling from corner to

corner, clinching and sparring without a single wallop going over. Moran looked like a novice and Johnson was plainly holding back. Just as the round ended, Moran hooked with the left. The blow went around Johnson's neck and a left sent Frank's head back.
