LAST OPEN HOUSE AT POWER PLANT

From 8 Until 12 O'clock Tomorrow Big Structure in River Will be Open to Visitors Without Passes.

CLOSED AFTER 12 O'CLOCK

No Passes Even Can be Issued for Afternoon When Employees Will Enjoy Their Vacation.

The last open house of the season for the Mississippi River Power company will be tomorrow morning when the power plant will be thrown open to visitors from 8 to 12 o'clock. After 12 o'clock the employees of the company will be given a chance to enjoy their Fourth of July, and the works will be closed completely to all visitors.

No passes are to be required to make the inspection trip through the power plant and the lock tomorrow morning. But after 12 o'clock the works will be closed completely and no passes will be issued during the afternoon, and there will be no way possible of seeing the interior of the big plant.

The company has twice before this summer held open houses. One of these times was on the occasion of the U. C. T. convention, and the other was as the time the Eagles held their convention here.

So many people asked to be admitted to the big water power plant here in the Mississippi river, that the company decided to keep open house for visitors on the Fourth of July. The entrance on the Iowa side of the river will be thrown open to all persons over sixteen years old from eight o'clock until noon on that day.

Since the company began operating the big plant, it has been necessary to limit the number of visitors there, and parties of over ten persons must be personally conducted by several company men. Thus placed between its desire to show courtesy to everybody and the necessities of operation, the company has to do some careful planning. Out of this grew four open house dates this summer, of which the one on the glorious Fourth is the last.

Children under sixteen years old are never admitted under any circumstances. Adults will need no passes during the forenoon of the Fourth of July.

50,000 STRANGERS AT SIOUX CITY RACS

300 Mile Race for \$25,000 Prize to be Run on Dirt Track Tomorrow at Sioux City

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] SIOUX CITY, Iowa, July 3.—Joe Horann slated to drive a Metropole car in the 300 mile race for the \$25,000 prize tomorrow is out of it, having broken a crank shaft while speeding 80 miles an hour in the trials. Billy Chandler and George Babcock, were struck by flying dirt in the preliminaries yesterday and injured but will be able to start. Crowds are coming in on all trains and strings of autos fill every road indicating that at least 50,000 strangers will be here for the event tomorrow. The governor of South Dakota has given permission to allow 150 Iowa national guardsmen to cross the state line and patrol the track to prevent accidents.

ACTUAL EXPENSES OF COURTS SMALL

Fees Paid in Justice Court and County Expenses Constitute Over Half of Total Cost.

REPORT COVERS COUNTY

Includes Salaries of County Attorney and All Expenses in Criminal Cases Throughout Lee District.

The actual expenses of the district courts at Keokuk and Fort Madison are small as compared with the total criminal expense of the county which includes, justice of the peace, magistrates or police courts, feeding prisoners in the county jail, taking prisoners to prison or jail, attorneys fees allowed in defense of criminals and numerous other expenditures.

The total cost of criminal prosecutions for the year ending June 30, 1914, for Lee county as shown by the report of Clerk Hart is \$27,722.08. This includes, however, not only the expenses of the two district courts and the county attorneys and reporters, but also fees paid by the county in all justice of the peace courts, magistrate courts and police courts. This item alone is \$7,318.80.

Salaries of Attorneys.
Another item in the report which would stand whether there was one day of court or a hundred is that of the county attorney and his assistant, making a total of \$2,750.00. County jail expenses amount to \$7,231.96. Jail expenses and fees paid in criminal cases before the justices and magistrates amounts to more than half of the total expenses if one will take the trouble to figure a little.

Grand jurors and petit jurors in the cases at Fort Madison and Keokuk were paid a little over \$4,000 in the year from June 30, 1913, to June 30, 1914. Some of the important jury trials in this connection might be mentioned as the O'Donnell case and the Baynard case. Both of these took considerable time for trial. Witness fees in the criminal cases amount to a little over \$1,000.
