Meeting to Be Held Tonight at Elks Club for Purpose of Considering Committee's Report.

General Policy Remains Same at That Proposed at Meeting Two Weeks Ago Tonight.

There will be a meeting this evening at 8:00 o'clock at the Elks club of the Keokuk Retailers' association for the purpose of considering the re-draft of the constitution and by-laws which was put into the hands of a committee to make, following the meeting two weeks ago. The re-draft is now ready and it is expected will be adopted verbatim tonight.

The constitution has been very slightly amended and the by-laws have been shortened. The general policy of the association has not been changed from that which was adhered to at the previous meeting.

The meeting tonight will be of much interest to the various retail interests of the city, and representatives should be present from all of the retail interests. It is expected that there will be a goodly number at the meeting to discuss the proposed changes.

It was two weeks ago that the first meeting was held for the purpose of forming the association. This meeting was well attended and the enthusiasm evidenced at the meeting forecasts a successful association.

The business of the association will be carried on by the officers and a board of five directors, who will be chosen as provided for in the by-laws. The association will hold regular meetings on the second Tuesday of each month and the annual meeting will be on the second Tuesday in January.

There will be seven sub-committees of the association—legislation, grievance, membership, publicity, general improvement, trade extension, and entertainment.

TOWNE'S ADDRESS AT PARK MEETING

He Asks Whether Religion is Liability or Asset in Your Mind in His Talk Sunday.

ONLY SLIGHT CHANGES MUST HAVE RIGHT VIEW

General Policy Remains Same at That Proposed at Meeting Two Weeks Ago Tonight.

The open air meeting at Rang park yesterday was addressed by O. B. Towne of the Industrial association. Among the things Mr. Towne said were the following:

"Is your religion an asset or is it a liability? Is it a comfort and an inspiration or is it a costly responsibility? Is your church a social organization to be kept up at considerable expense or is it an investment which brings you ample returns in the work it is doing?"

"In answer to the above I need only to cite you to the great things that have been accomplished as a result of inspiration given to people through the church. I need only refer you to the purpose and the fundamental principles on which the church is founded. I need only to refer you to that inner, intangible something, which we call a soul, and which is immortal, in order to bring to your mind the basic principles and the basic purpose of the church.

Is There Tangible Value.

"Some people have asked the question, whether or not there is any tangible value to the doctrines of the church. It is a well known fact that the great things of this world have only been accomplished through inspiration. Hope of greater things has made a leader out of many a boy in the world. It is this inspiration, this soul value which raises man above the animal and makes it possible for him to glory and to be honored because of the inspiration given to those with whom he has come in contact and those who come under his influence.

"A man who sees nothing but the grind of his daily work becomes a drudge and a machine. The man who realizes and appreciates the real value of life becomes a man with hope and love, the common virtues and divine inspiration. It is upon this inspiration, upon this hope that our civilization has depended. On account of it our civilization has advanced, bringing us up from the savage. It is because of that we have hope for greater things in this present life and in the hereafter. This inspiration of divine life has given us all of those great institutions which make for the benefit of mankind and for that distribution of happiness and joy. It is upon this that we must depend if life is to mean anything to us more than it means to the animal and the machine.

Difference in Basis.

"It makes a difference from which basis you consider the church and your religion, whether or not it is an asset or a liability. If it is an asset to you then you have the right view of life and you see something more in it than that which is visible and tangible. You see that which is eternal. You see that which will make humanity better and life happier. If you see it in the light of a liability than your hope is gone, your church is a farce, you see nothing beyond the animal existence, you have no faith, you have no trust, you have no future.

"Which is your religion to you? Is it an inspiration or is it a responsibility? It behooves us well in this day and generation to consider these things seriously and to consider them well.

KEOKUK WAS HOT BUT NOT HOTTEST

Phoenix, Ariz., Claimed That Honor Yesterday With Temperature of 104.

Keokuk was not the hottest point on the weather map yesterday despite the general feeling of the natives that it must have been. The highest temperature reached during the day was 94. It was 90 last evening at 7:00 o'clock. St. Louis, New Orleans and Nashville were of the same temperature as Keokuk. Phoenix, Ariz., was the hot spot of the day with temperature of 104.

The weather man has promised some relief from the warm weather in his forecast for tomorrow, which says something about cloudy and cool weather. Signs such as the persistence with which flies stick, point to some rain also.

Perhaps one thing which made the day seem hotter yesterday was the fact that it was the second dry day in the week. Saturday being a legal holiday, followed by Sunday, no doubt caused some of the thirsty ones no small amount of uneasiness and sorrow. The oases were opened this morning and were the mecca for those who had that terrible burning two day thirst in their mouths.

STEVEN FOUNTAIN FROM NEAR CORYDON

Died at a Local Hospital, Where He Had Been Taken for Treatment.

Stephen Fountain, a well known and popular resident of Wayne county, near Corydon, who was brought to a Keokuk hospital for treatment for kidney trouble, died at that institution at 10:30 o'clock last night. He had been seriously ill about three months.

The deceased was born in Davis county, Iowa, and was about seventy-three years of age. Born in this state at so early a day, his life has been eventful. He witnessed and in fact grew up in the pioneer days of the state, when sturdy manhood met the conditions of wild, uncultivated land and by steady exertion and honest persistent toil the virgin soil of prairie and woodland were brought to a state of cultivation to bring forth bounteous crops; the rudely constructed homes of the pioneers and old settlers have given place to residences such as the old lords of the manor have rejoiced to possess.

In 1871 he located in Wayne county near Corydon, the county seat, where he had since resided. He was a member of one of the protestant adventist churches, a man of strong personality and friendships. He was a good husband a kind father and a generous and obliging neighbor. He is survived by his wife, one daughter and one son.

His son is in the city and the remains will be taken to a train this evening and taken to his Wayne county home for burial.
