NEW YORK, July 10.—Although on the verge of nervous collapse and shaken with emotion upon the receipt of a letter from her little daughter, in which the child said, "I don't quite know why you don't come home," Mrs. Florence Carman put up a brave front in her cell in the Mineola jail today where she is being held in connection with the murder of Mrs. Louise Bailey.

Mrs. Carman seemed somewhat stronger today. Her chief concern was the welfare of her daughter, twelve. She broke down and wept bitterly as she read over and over again a letter from the child. "Dear Mammy," the little girl wrote. "We are thinking of you all ways. I do not quite know why you don't come home. If I do not see Mr. Pettit (the sheriff) soon I'll write to ask him to bring you back."

The authorities received an anonymous letter purporting to be from a trained nurse. It read: "For God's sake free Mrs. Carman. She is a good honest woman. I fired the shot. I meant to get Dr. Carman. He knows why. I will get him yet."

Onel Roosevelt has a secret plank in the progressive platform providing that Mexico must be divided into four or five parts. The democrats and republicans believe in the same principle, Moheno believes. "Francisco Escudero, Carranza's minister of foreign relations, has shown me letters from Americans which proved to me that Roosevelt's progressives have such a secret plank," he said.

Moheno sent a thrust in the direction of President Wilson, by saying: "While President Wilson has been occupied with high ideals, 8,000 Mexicans have been killed daily for the past six months. Figure out for yourself the cost of an idea."

Moheno intimated that his trip from Mexico City was in the nature of a fight. He was on board the steamer Espagne. "I'm going to New York," he said, "to tell the public, through books and by lectures, how President Wilson has been in the war with Mexico. The American government is sorry now that it ever landed troops at Vera Cruz. Why is it American soldiers are here? Is it because Mexico wouldn't salute the flag? No, it is because politicians of all parties in America are planning to control all Central American territory down to the Panama canal and to divide Mexico into small but easily controlled republics."

"Huerta is defeated and Wilson has conquered—but the end is not yet. Bandits will foment another revolution that Carranza will have a terrible time quelling. "I am not going to start a revolution myself—the revolution will grow of its own accord."

STATE OFFICIALS GIVEN THE BLAME

Christian Endeavor Union Speaker Demands Enforcement of the Law.

(United Press Leased Wire Service.) PEORIA, Ill., July 10.—Blame for the failure of the Lorimer-Munday banks in Illinois today was placed on state officials by A. L. Hegert of Chicago, vice president, speaking before the convention of Illinois Christian Endeavor Union. He was supporting a resolution demanding law enforcement.

"The laxity of law enforcement on the part of the state officials is responsible for the rotten conditions disclosed in the Lorimer-Munday bank scandal," said Hegert. "Hundreds of poor people, who cannot afford the loss of their hard earned savings are suffering because of this failure. And that could have been avoided if the officials had enforced the law."

The resolution declared laxity of law enforcement on the part of public officials is destroying civic ideals and called on Governor Dunne to back enforcement of the law. The resolution read in part: "That the Illinois Christian Endeavor Union urge Governor Dunne rigidly to enforce in every town and city having saloons, the state law providing for the closing of saloons on Sunday."

Nicholas L. Johnson of Batavia, a former member of the legislature and former state president of the union, in seconding the resolution said: "When Governor Dunne was mayor of Chicago, a few years ago, he side-stepped responsibility for closing of saloons on Sunday by declaring it was up to the state officials because it was a state law that required their closing. Now he is governor of Illinois and according to his own statement it is his duty to enforce the law."

FILE MOTION FOR CHANGE OF VENUE

Preliminary Report of Receiver for Seither-Moore Company Filed This Morning.



The report shows that the total liabilities of the company amount to \$2,793.62, the assets \$1,175.23, and the expenses of administration amount to \$469.12, leaving a total of \$716.11 for payment on liabilities. It was asked in the report that the court authorize declaring a dividend of 20 per cent on the indebtedness.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Higher cables, hot weather northwest and very light acceptances of bids for terminal markets made a firmer opening for wheat.
