AUTO REGISTRATION TO PASS 100,000

Licenses for 97,100 Cars Already Have Been Issued by State Department.

July 25, has been fixed as the probable date when the automobile registration in Iowa will pass the 100,000 mark, says the Register and Leader. Up to last night licenses had been issued for 97,100 cars and at the rate applications for number plates have been received, the department will start on the second hundred thousand plates before the end of the month.

Aug. 1 the rate of registering new cars will be out in two, but this concession made by the state has not had the effect of indicating any new auto owner to delay in getting number plates.

Placing the average value of the 97,000 auto registered at \$1,000 each, the people of Iowa have \$97,000,000 invested in motor cars and motor trucks. This is said to be almost as much as the farmers of the state have invested in farm machinery. Of the 97,000 machines owned in this state, about 2,500 are registered from Polk county.

The state department now has \$275,507.74 in the second installment of the state auto tax, which will be distributed among the counties of the state on Aug. 1. The first apportionment of the year made on April 1, distributed more than \$500,000 among the counties. This amount was left after 15 per cent had been deducted, a part of which went to the highway commission and the remainder to pay the expenses of the motor vehicle department, from auto registration for the twelve months beginning Aug. 1, 1913, and ending July 31, 1914, will be between \$900,000 and \$1,000,000.
