

BIG BARN BURNED LATE LAST NIGHT Barn on Farm North of Sandusky was Struck by Lightning After Midnight. A big barn on the farm of Tim Moriarity, one mile northwest of Sandusky, burned last night at about one o'clock. The damage amounts to nearly \$1,000 and was covered by but a small amount of insurance. It is believed that the fire was caused by lightning during the storm last evening. Although no horses were burned, practically nothing was saved. The loft was filled with hay and about \$300 was lost on this account. The barn, harness, wagon and other articles burned in the fire were valued at over \$600. A number of people in Keokuk saw the reflection of the fire and today described it as appearing to be close to this city. Several said that it appeared to be just over the Anschutz hill.
