

FIELD AGENT FOR ASSOCIATION HERE

E. L. Rose Talks Terminal in His Visit Here in Interest of Upper Mississippi River Improvement Association.

ARCHITECTURE IS SAME

Difference Between Upper and Lower Points Will be in Machinery Used Says Expert.

E. L. Rose, field agent for the Upper Mississippi River Improvement association, was in Keokuk today in conference with Wells M. Irwin of the executive committee, and L. A. Hamill, vice president for Iowa.

Mr. Rose said that there had been no small amount of talk going the rounds, that the upper and lower river cities were at loggerheads in regard to the style of terminals.

The association's field agent had a good word to say for the Keokuk men who are in the movement.

Pushing Terminals Plan.

All of the river towns with a population of 5,000 or better will be visited by the field agent.

The convention at Hannibal last year provided for the employment of a field agent who will devote his entire time to the development work and gather and classify data and information with reference to possible tonnage and special conditions at each of the cities and towns between Minneapolis, St. Paul and St. Louis.

Barge lines have already been put in operation and more are being organized for through traffic.

Is on Business Basis.

The work of the association is developing into a broad gauge business policy to complete the improvements necessary and vital to all cities.

These Cities Are Active.

Hampson, Ill., has expended approximately \$6,000 on what is considered one of the most modern and accessible steamboat docks and boat houses on the upper Mississippi river.

Davenport is investing \$300,000 in docks and terminals, and is getting part of her investment back in land accretions which will be subject to lease for industrial purposes.

St. Paul has expended several millions to straighten the river and provide the terminals from which they anticipate early returns from barge line operations, lines owned and controlled by the large shippers of the Twin Cities.

St. Louis is Interested.

St. Louis through her city plan commission is giving the subject the most careful study to provide suitable and adequate terminals and docks, and further to provide a municipal railroad to cover the entire city along the river.

Figures by their consulting engineer covering four wharves complete with the latest improved handling machinery, covering alternative cities near Eads bridge, vary from \$1,585,000 to \$1,700,000.

Such investments as above are being made and considered only in view of the assured trend of events in the traffic field and the Upper Mississippi River Improvement association in putting its energy and efforts into this development work.
