EXAMINE COMPANY, BROKE TRUST LAW?

Swift & Company Being Investigated by Examiners for Supreme Court of Missouri.

UNFAIR COMPETITION

Unfair Discrimination Has Been Used by Company in Belief of Missouri Attorney General.

Charges that the local house of Swift & Co. have been violating the anti-trust laws of the state of Missouri are being investigated by Judge Nat M. Shelton of Macon, Mo., who was appointed examiner to take depositions, by the supreme court of that state.

A preliminary application was filed in the supreme court of Missouri in June by the state's attorney general stating that he had reason to believe the wholesale produce company was using unfair discrimination and competition in its business. It was on this application that Judge Shelton was appointed examiner by the court. On the testimony taken by the examiner quo warranto proceedings may be started to oust the company from doing business in the state of Missouri, it is understood.

With Judge Shelton is Assistant Attorney General L. B. Ewing, Senator Walter C. Goodson of Macon, engaged by the attorney general, and Mr. G. C. Le Compte, Judge Shelton's stenographer. Mr. C. J. Tressler of Chicago and Mr. R. B. Williams of Booneville, Missouri, are representing the company which is undergoing the investigation.

Does Business in Missouri.

Although the local branch of Swift and Company is located in the state of Iowa, it does much business in the northeast part of the state of Missouri where produce of various kinds are purchased by agents or representatives of the company and shipped to this city from where it is sent out in large quantities, chiefly to the larger cities in the east.

The charges against the company are that it uses unfair competition and unfair discrimination in purchasing produce within the state of Missouri. At places where there is no local plant, and consequently little or no competition, the company is alleged to pay prices of from two to six cents lower than in towns where there is competition by a local plant. This has the effect, it is claimed, of forcing the small concern to the wall.

Case in Missouri Courts.

The charges against the company are based on an alleged violation of a Missouri statute which is similar to the Sherman anti-trust law. For this reason if the report of the examiner, now in the city, is believed to justify a suit against the company it will be tried by the supreme court of Missouri instead of by the federal courts.

Judge Shelton and his party, as well as the attorneys for Swift and Company, arrived in the city yesterday and probably will leave this evening. Yesterday afternoon Judge Shelton and Mr. Le Compte obtained passes and made a trip over the plant of the Mississippi River Power company which Judge Shelton referred to today as "the most stupendous engineering project he had ever seen."

The visitors spent several hours in making their trip and were immensely interested in what they saw.

"Had he had other letters we would have found them after his death. We found nothing."

of Spaniards Villa expelled from northern Mexico.

Looks Good for Peace. WASHINGTON, July 21.—That Carranza has agreed to make material concessions to Acting President Carbajal and that the United States will give him its unqualified support, was admitted today in official quarters. This means that he will have the aid of the United States and the South American governments in opposing any counter revolution which started by Villa or any other malcontent.

While the administration considers it too early to make any statements, it is admitted if Carranza and Carbajal reach an agreement it will be considered that the terms arranged at Niagara Falls have been complied with and there will be immediate recognition of the provisional government. This is considered absolutely necessary so that Carranza can get the cash needed for the immediate necessities of the government as the Mexico City treasury is absolutely empty.

All obligations incurred by Huerta after October 1, 1913, are to be repudiated by the new government. Some are admittedly legal and will be honored as an "act of grace" and not one of right, the state department having been notified by Carranza that it is his intention to protect the national credit.

When this was read by the clerk there was first a restless movement throughout the court room, then low murmurs gradually growing in volume until Presiding Judge Albani sharply called for order and threatened to arrest the disturbers.

Caillaux himself was the principal witness today, his story all but rivaling the sensation created by the reading of the deposition of the president. He told of the threat he had made against Calmette to his wife, how she apparently pondered over it and how wounded, harassed and nerve shaken, he left her when he went to the senate.

It was after Mme. Caillaux's visit to Judge Monier when she was told that nothing could be done to prevent the publication of the letters by Calmette that Caillaux made his threat.

Mrs. Caillaux arrived at the ministry at midday, Caillaux testified. She asked him what he proposed doing.

"If that's the way things stand, I'll smash his face," Caillaux said he replied. (The French slang expression "Casser La Geule" might be meant.)
