DAWSON ATTACKS STONE IN SPEECH

Former Keokuk Lawyer Now Running in Missouri for Senator, Opens Campaign in St. Louis.

BELIEVES HE WILL WIN

Says People Should Not Forget Present Incumbent's Blunders at Baltimore Convention in 1912.

John M. Dawson, who came to Keokuk last September to open a law practice here, and who has gone back to Kahoka and has entered the political field in the race for nomination for senator against the present holder, Senator Stone, spoke night before last at St. Louis, and gave Stone a severe grilling.

The Post Dispatch reports his speech as follows: John M. Dawson, formerly an assistant attorney-general, and now a candidate for the democratic nomination for United States senator, opened his campaign in St. Louis with a five-minute speech at the nineteenth ward democratic meeting at Easton and Garrison avenues Tuesday night.

After 25 candidates for judgeships, clerks of various courts, justices of peace and other city offices had spoken, Dawson was introduced. He devoted his full time to an attack on Senator William J. Stone.

Attacks Senator Stone. "Senator Stone is old and in his dotage," Dawson said, "and he has not been able to attend to his duties much of the time for the past year.

Not With Stone. "As it is you have been voting against the successful candidates, and what have you got? Nothing, St. Louis has been given no consideration in the appointments to win out in the state and I believe I'm going to carry St. Louis.

Lawyer Speaks for Stone. Dawson lives in Kahoka, Clark county. He is 45 years old. He was an assistant in the office of Governor Major when Major was attorney-general.


