PLAT IS FILED OF ILLINOIS HOLDINGS

Mississippi River Power Co., Files Document With Recorder at Quincy.

A plat containing a description of all of the Adams county holdings of the Mississippi River Power company was filed yesterday afternoon in the office of County Recorder James Buffington, says the Quincy Journal, the feature of the plat being the nature of arrangement as regards the description of the property, which will make it much easier for tax collectors, and everybody connected with the land from the standpoint of records to locate the property.

The plat consists of a huge book, about five by two and one-half feet, containing many pages. Instead of the land being described in sections, as has been the case, wherever possible it is described as lots and blocks, making it much easier to record, and inquire into, those connected with the work say.

The company has holdings in six townships in Adams county, as follows: Payson, Melrose, Ursa, Ellington, Lima and Fall Creek.

APPRAISERS REPORT ON ATLEE'S ESTATE

Took Six Days to Secure Figures Necessary for Inheritance Tax Assessment.

The collateral inheritance tax commissioners for this district, H. J. Schroeder, H. A. Skyles and Joseph Friedel, have filed their inventory of appraisal of the estate of the late Samuel Atlee. It shows the estate to be possessed of a half interest in personal and real estate valued at a total of \$167,467.31, says the Fort Madison Democrat.

Real estate is valued at \$89,641. The piece valued the highest is the mill lot, including the electric light plant and the planing mill, placed at \$27,000. The lowest valuation is \$5.00, placed upon the east six feet of lot 4, block, 1 southwest addition to the city.

The personal property inventory includes 211 shares of Fort Madison street railway stock at a total value of \$100; nine first mortgage bonds of the Fort Madison Water company at \$900; twenty second mortgage bonds of the Fort Madison Water company at \$1,400. The personal property totals \$76,374.31. Much of it is in notes and accounts.

The commissioners append a bill for six days' labor and mileage.

IN A BIG HURRY LEFT HIS SINKERS

What Happened to an Eager, Anxious Local Fisherman This Morning.

It was a plain case of over-taxed hurry and enthusiasm. He is usually a very thoughtful, careful, methodical man but when any man is preparing for a days fishing in July in this brain-stormy age, there forms a rattling in his hat-knob which is wonderful and for which there is no practical accounting.

And not long after his departure, the eight or ten chosen sinkers he had selected and approved from the quart, were discovered still lying quietly on the desk in the office.

At a late hour, even up to noon, the hurried fisherman, the methodical business man had not returned for his lost sinkers, but was depending on pebbles picked up from the shore, to hold his hooks below the surface.

One envious friend sincerely remarked, "it doesn't make a particle of difference—he won't catch any fish anyway."

That's all right, but when he comes back his first remark will be "we caught fish."

RECALLS INTEREST OF HUGH L. COOPER

His interest in the dam was keen, and so much did his interest interest others, that the attention of Chief Engineer Hugh L. Cooper's big heart responded. Mr. Cutler received a personal visit from the great engineer and an active correspondence was entered upon, and Mr. Cutler was Mr. Cooper's guest many times in Keokuk. This was the most satisfying thing that came into the late life of Mr. Cutler, save his kind and comfortable home with Mrs. Cutler since the death of his wife, and he took great pride in it all.
