### SEES NOTHING IN RAILROAD STORY

A. W. Eberhardt, Division Freight Agent of Rock Island, Believes Purchase of Branch Not Contemplated.

### ERB ALSO DENIES IT

President of M. & St. L. Says His Road Is Not in Financial Condition to Take This Step.

A. W. Eberhardt, division freight agent of the Rock Island, was in the city today. Mr. Eberhardt, in conversation with a railroad man today here, said that he did not believe there was anything in the Register and Leader's story to the effect that the M. & St. L. road was intending to take over the Keokuk and Des Moines branch of the Rock Island.

The story originated, it is believed, from Huntington's trip from Des Moines to Oskaloosa over the Rock Island. At Oskaloosa he was taken over his own road to his destination. This trip, it is believed, is responsible for the story.

The Des Moines Capital yesterday printed a denial of the Register and Leader's story from President Erb of the M. & St. L. road. The Capital's story follows:

No railroads will be taken over, no extensions will be made, no new lines will be constructed by the Minneapolis & St. Louis road nor are such improvements under contemplation at this time according to Newman Erb, president of the company, who made a flying trip to Des Moines this morning.

### Finances Make It Impossible.

Mr. Erb said that the financial situation at the present time is not of a sort to encourage any railroad to spend large sums of money.

Mr. Erb was asked if there is anything in the crop situation in the west to encourage a change in the situation this fall. He said: "I see no hope of a change until there is a different attitude toward the railroads. An increase in freight rates would have an immediate effect on the situation. This is the situation that weighs against Iowa as well as other states of the west. The railroads are the big employers of labor; they are the large buyers of material. While their operating expenses have been increased, their earning capacity has been diminished."

### No New Extension.

Between this city and Oskaloosa the Minneapolis line uses the Burlington tracks to connect with its Peoria line and it has been reported that it might build its own line between these points. The Rock Island has also been sued for an accounting of the leased Keokuk & Des Moines line. It has been rumored that the Minneapolis road might take over this line if it were released by the Rock Island. Mr. Erb said that the Minneapolis & St. Louis would take over no property unless under the pressure of circumstances now unforeseen.

In Mr. Erb's party were: C. W. Huntington, vice president and general manager; F. H. Davis, vice president and treasurer; A. C. Doan, secretary; W. H. Bremner, general solicitor; F. B. Townsend, assistant freight agent; E. E. Kerwin, general superintendent and several of the division superintendents.

### LEE PROGRESSIVES HAVE STRUCK SNAG

Secretary of State Allen Has Ruled Sanders and Roberts Are Not Entitled to Places.

### PRIMARY NOMINEES WIN

Hitch and Grimwood Should Have Names on Ticket, so Official Declares in Ruling.

Lee county progressives, evidently have struck a snag, according to a ruling by Secretary of State W. S. Allen in which he declares that Rev. J. F. Sanders of this city and W. B. Roberts of Fort Madison, candidates for representative and senator, are not legally entitled to a place on the ballot.

Under the ruling of the secretary of state, the men who were on the ticket at the primary election, W. H. Grimwood and P. G. Hitch, Jr., are the ones who are entitled to go on the ticket at the November election.

According to the secretary's ruling the men who received 35 percent of the vote at the primary are the ones whose names will go on the ticket, and not the choice of the convention. It is claimed that Grimwood and Hitch received the requisite number of votes, and that they will be the ones who are on the ticket.

J. L. Benbow recently gave as his opinion, that Sanders and Roberts would be the nominees of the party at the November election. Mr. Benbow is the county chairman.

As the secretary of state's decision is probably the one to be accepted as final, the Keokuk man and the Fort Madison man will have to give way to the two Fort Madison candidates. It looks as if the progressive barge in Lee county was navigating in some shoal water and perilously close to the rocks, with all this apparent dissension in the camp.

The Des Moines Capital gives Secretary Allen's decision in the following terms:

Progressives of Lee county have run into the ruling of the secretary of state in which it is ordered that candidates who received 35 percent of the vote for that office at the primary must be the nominees and not the men named at the conventions following. W. H. Grimwood and P. G. Hitch, Jr., of Ft. Madison had their names written in on the ballot for state representative and state senator, respectively, at the primary. They received the required majority of votes. The convention, however, named the Rev. J. F. Sanders of Keokuk for representative and W. B. Roberts for senator. Secretary Allen holds that the latter cannot be placed on the ballot.

### Street Car Strike Riots.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] ST. JOHNS, N. B., July 24.—Fearing resumption of serious riots which yesterday marked the strike of street car employes, the authorities today asked for troops from Halifax. Today they were advised that a detachment of 110 men from the permanent troops of the Halifax garrison were being sent on a special train.

So far a number of street cars have been destroyed and strike breakers stoned and injured by mobs on the streets. Soldiers yesterday were forced to charge a mob which gathered in Market square and which dragged cars from the tracks.

### 15 Drinks in 20 Minutes.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, July 24.—Can a man go to a saloon fifteen times in twenty minutes, each time taking a drink of whiskey?

He can. At least a witness testified that Franklin D. Wetters had done it, in Wetters' own affairs. Questioned closely by lawyers, the witness said that Wetters' time for the trips to the saloon were slower on the last three or four than on the first ten and eleven. He explained this by saying that whiskey in bulk does not travel in a straight line.

Despite the whiskey witness Wetters, who is wealthy, convinced a jury that he is capable of managing his own affairs.

### HAD PETITION FOR THE KING

Two Women Arrested While Trying to Force Way into Buckingham Palace.

that they should also be heard in the struggle for the vote. The petition which Lady Berkeley and Miss Fitzgerald endeavored to present today declares the militant suffragettes are no worse rebels than are the Ulster leaders, received by the king.

"You not only received them but condoned their lawless violent methods by saying to them: 'The trend has been surely and steadily toward an appeal to force and today the cry of civil war is on the lips of the most responsible and sober minded of my people,'" the petition declared.

Mrs. Pankhurst claims in the petition that "equally responsible sober-minded and public spirited are the women who have resorted to militant methods because they found all other methods for winning the just rights to vote ineffectual."
