



DIED LAST NIGHT AT LOCAL HOSPITAL

Mr. Rosebury was unmarried.

The remains will be taken to Elvaston, Ill., for burial.

—Iowa will have a tremendous grape crop, according to the August fruit report issued yesterday by Wesley Greene, state horticulturist. Nothing has occurred since spring to affect the grape vines, so that now there is a prospect of 81 per cent of a full crop. This means that Iowa will have more than it can use and probably more than it can find a market for outside the state. Apples have continued to drop off in prospects. The summer variety now promises only 11 per cent of a full crop. The general condition of fruits is 31 per cent, 5 points behind the 1912 crop.



—Quincy Journal: Captain Walter Wisler will return to St. Louis tonight where he will superintend the work of raising the steamer Majestic, at Chain of Rocks, above the Missouri town. Two divers are now at work on the hull, making preparations for raising the vessel and a number more will be put to work immediately. The vessel now rests in eighteen feet of water and the entire upper works and boiler deck are out of water. The principal damage consists of the wrecked superstructure, or upper works, and the hole in the hull, 20 by 4 feet, will prove the least part of the actual damage. The river is still falling and it is expected that the craft will be floating and ready to be towed to dry dock in about two weeks.

—The Iowa weather crop bulletin for the week ending August 2 has just been issued as follows: Quite general showers occurred on Thursday and Thursday night, but the amount of rainfall was unevenly distributed. In some localities the rainfall was nil, while in others the amounts were light to heavy; the southern counties received the least. In some localities, in the northern counties there was sufficient rainfall to insure the early corn, but for the state as a whole, and especially in the southern districts, corn, potatoes and pastures are suffering rain badly. Corn has already needed considerable damage in the southern part of the state, but the average condition of the whole crop is only four points below the July 1st estimate, or 97 per cent. Much trouble is being experienced in southern districts in obtaining water for stock and for threshing. Small streams and many wells are dry. Threshing is progressing rapidly under favorable conditions. Preliminary estimates show the average yield of winter wheat to be about twenty-three bushels per acre; spring wheat, sixteen; oats, thirty-four; barley, twenty-seven and rye, nineteen bushels per acre. If these estimates are maintained by final returns the state will produce about 175,000,000 bushels of oats; 16,500,000 of wheat; 11,000,000 of barley and 1,200,000 bushels of rye.
