BIG CROWD MAKES DONNELSON TRIP

Keokuk Day at Lee County Fair Proves Big Success in Standpoint of Number Attending.

SPECIAL CARRIES MANY

Delegations in Autos and Motorcycles Equaled by Similar Ones on Train Which Left at Noon.

This was Keokuk day at the Lee County fair at Donnellson.

A delegation went to Donnellson in forty automobiles and there was a big crowd on the special train which pulled out of the station at 12:30 o'clock. It was estimated that there were between 250 and 500 Keokuk people on the grounds at Donnellson during the day. Twelve motorcycles carried their quota and there were a number of people who were already at Donnellson from here.

The Keokuk Retailers league had the trip in charge and secured about forty machines for the trip. The plan originally was for all of the cars to leave Fifth and Main streets at 12:30 o'clock. Some of the auto drivers, however, decided to escape as much of the dust as possible and went out earlier in the day.

Several of the local merchants took occasion to go early in order to distribute their advertising matter, and to meet some of their customers. Others, who made up several parties, went out in time to spend the entire day and to take their lunches with them.

Banners and Badges.

The rest of the crowd went out at 12:30 o'clock, leaving Fifth street two blocks apart and with orders to keep that distance. The Keokuk machines were all decorated. Besides the Keokuk pennants which are carried on most of the local cars, the league furnished broad white banners which buttoned across the back of the cars and bore the words: "Keokuk Retailers League." Then every occupant of the car wore a red ribbon badge which bore the name Keokuk in bold type.

The crowd which went up on the Burlington route special all wore badges, and when they got to the fair grounds met the rest of the Keokuk crowd and helped to make Keokuk day a big success. There was a big crowd on the train, and the Citizens band was taken along.

Parade at Donnellson.

Arriving at Donnellson, the plan was to have all of the cars meet in a body and parade around the race track, headed by the Citizens band. The band was one of the big hits of the day, and their music both at the station at Keokuk and at the Donnellson grounds was appreciated.

Chris Haffner, secretary of the Donnellson Fair association, in writing to The Gate City about the proposed trip today said that the Donnellson people appreciated the efforts the local merchants were making. The Donnellson people want the Keokuk crowd to parade around the race track on their arrival as was stated yesterday in The Gate City, and Mr. Haffner writes that the races will be held until after the automobile parade around the track.

The parade was headed by the band and all of the machines from Keokuk lined up and made the circuit. After the parade the machines were parked near the race track fence and had a good view of all of the track events of the afternoon.

Agne's Moonlight Excursion.


