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

Weather Conditions.
Under the influence of persistent high pressure in the southeastern states the warm wave continued from the plains to the central valleys, where the temperature was generally above 90 yesterday, reaching 104 at North Platte, and 100 at Omaha, Neb. The western area of low pressure is advancing slowly, with its center near Omaha this morning, and there have been scattered showers or thunderstorms from the northern plains to the western lake region.
There have also been heavy local rains along the gulf coast.
The western field of high pressure has overspread the northern mountain region, with cooler weather, and conditions indicate unsettled weather for this section tonight and Wednesday, with probably local showers or thunderstorms, and cooler Wednesday.

In some of the southern counties, corn is being cut to save the fodder. Pastures are brown and afford but little or no feed. Spring seeded grasses are burned out, and late potatoes are suffering badly. Shallow wells and small streams are dry, and the lack of water for stock is serious. Threshing is progressing rapidly and is completed in many localities. But little fall plowing has been done.
