RED CROSS SEEKS AID FROM CITIES

Appeals Addressed to City Councils and Commercial Organizations— to Alleviate Suffering in War.

NO APPEAL TO KEOKUK

Mayor Doubts Authority of City to Appropriate Funds for This Purpose—Quincy Takes Action.

The American Red Cross society is sending out appeals for funds to many cities in this country for the purpose of alleviating suffering among the wounded soldiers in Europe. City councils of Quincy and Burlington and business organizations of those cities have already been appealed to. Mayor Moorhead said today that no request of this kind had yet been received by the local council.

"Had we received an appeal we would be glad to do what we could," said the mayor, "but I doubt if we have the authority to appropriate any of the city's funds for this purpose." Commissioner Collins expressed the opinion that if the war in Europe continues any length of time that American cities will be called upon for funds much as they were at the time of the San Francisco disaster when \$2,000 was contributed by this city.

In response to requests for money from the American Red Cross at Washington, the Quincy city council yesterday passed the following resolution:

"Resolved: That we as sympathizers with our distressed brothers in foreign lands, meet the appeal from Washington by expressing ourselves heartily in favor of any suitable measure of relief, and suggest co-operation on the part of our citizens as showing the humanitarian side of the American sentiment in this crisis."

Other organizations at Quincy, such as the retail merchants association, the chamber of commerce, and other business organizations as well as churches and religious societies have expressed a willingness to do what they can toward raising funds for the Red Cross society. It is safe to say that if an appeal is received from the Red Cross by local organizations they will not be slow to respond.

DEED TRANSFERRING SCHOOL LOT FILED

Wentzel Property is Now Officially Recorded as Belonging to School District.

The warranty deed conveying the property known as lot 4 in Chatham Square from George and Julia Wentzel to the independent school district of Keokuk was filed for record today. The consideration in the deed is the same as was exclusively announced in The Gate City last week when the deal was made, \$4,250.

The deed transferring the property from the former owners to the Wentzels was filed July 20, 1904. There was a mistake in recording this and it was necessary to record it again, correctly. The amount paid for the property ten years ago was \$2,200, according to this old warranty deed.

CHARGES HUSBAND WAS CRUEL TO HER

Ethel Adams Files Suit for Divorce from Allen Adams in District Court Here.

Alleging that she has suffered cruel treatment and abuse at the hands of her husband, Ethel Adams has brought suit for divorce against Allen Adams. The petition was filed in the office of the clerk of the district court here. Adams is a carpenter working at Fort Madison.

Mrs. Adams claims that her husband abused and mistreated her. She asks that she be given the custody of their fourteen months old child and that her husband pay \$75 alimony, temporarily, and that the court order him to pay \$8 per week to the support of the child. She alleges he makes \$24 per week. The couple were married in Mount Sterling, Ill., August 29, 1911.

California Primaries.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Aug. 26.—John D. Fredericks of Los Angeles, has been nominated for governor of California by the republicans. Fred H. Hall by the democrats and Hiram W. Johnson by the progressives, according to incomplete returns today from the state wide primaries held yesterday. Other probable nominations are U. S. senator, Francis J. Henry, progressive; Sam'l. M. Shortridge, republican; James D. Phelan, democrat; Lieutenant Governor John M. Eshelman, republican and progressive; Joe V. Snyder, democrat. The count of the ballots is proceeding very slowly and will not be completed until late today.

General Clayton Died.

WASHINGTON, August 26.—General Powell Clayton, who for fifty years has been a figure in national politics as a republican, died at 8 o'clock last night in his apartments at Washington, after a long illness. He was 71 years old, on August 7, and a native of Pennsylvania. He served in the civil war as an officer, first as captain of the First Kansas Infantry, and later of the Fifth Kansas Cavalry.
