Miss Florence Brinkman is Assisting at American Embassy in Berlin in Giving Credentials to Our Citizens.

SHE MAY RETURN SOON

Talented Local Young Woman May Take Place of German Head of Music College in the East.

Keokuk people will feel that they have more than just a passing interest in the European struggle, when it is known that Miss Florence Brinkman, a Keokuk girl, has been helping to write passports at the American embassy at Berlin.

Mrs. J. Fred Kiedalsch has received a letter within the last few days from her sister Mrs. George Brinkman in Berlin, which is full of incidents giving a more intimate view of the war conditions in Germany.

The letter was posted by a friend of Mrs. Brinkman's who was on her way to England to try to bring home a German girl, who is in school in England.

May Return Later. She says they have not thought of trying to come home until the war rush is over unless Miss Brinkman should come to America to take Mr. Paul Stoye's position as head of the musical college in Bever, Penna.

Miss Brinkman has been helping to write passports at the embassy which has been crowded for weeks by Americans anxious to return.

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SCHOOL FIGURES SHOW INCREASE

Enrollment For First Day This Year is Practically 88 Above Enrollment Figures Last Year.

DISTRICT IS GAINING LOCAL MEN ATTENDING

These Figures Give Proof That the City is Not Doing Any Van Winkle Stunt at Present.

Enrollment figures for the first day of school in Keokuk show an increase of eighty-eight over the enrollment last year.

In one or two of the school buildings where there is a decrease of four or five, it is stated that this may be due to the weather for the opening day of the year.

School figures are said to be indexes to prosperity of the community. This being the case, they present another strong argument to the effect that Keokuk is most certainly alive and growing.

The gain in the Garfield school is in the beginning class, forty being enrolled in room 1, and practically all of this number means new pupils.

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CIVIC HEADS ON VISIT TO KEOKUK

League of Iowa Municipalities Comes Here Today on Steamer Sidney to View Water Power Plant.

LOCAL MEN ATTENDING

Mayor Moorhead and Commissioner Schmidt Were in Burlington and Arrived With Official Party This Afternoon.

The league of Iowa municipalities arrived in Keokuk this afternoon from Burlington on the steamer Sidney. The league was scheduled to arrive at 4:30 o'clock, and the trip was made for the purpose of seeing the big hydro-electric plant here.

Mayor S. W. Moorhead and F. T. F. Schmidt, commissioner of street and parks, were with the league on board the boat. J. A. M. Collins, commissioner of public safety, was not able to be at Burlington but met the boat on its arrival here.

The league delegates were met by Manager O. B. Towne of the Keokuk Industrial association, and James M. Fulton, secretary, and by an official of the Mississippi River Power company, who conducted the party over the works.

The boat unloaded its passengers at the lock, and the crowd was taken through the power house. After the power house trip, the party was to go back on the boat, and the Sidney would proceed to Burlington, after dropping down through the Keokuk lock and back, in order to give an idea of the working of the big government barrier here.

The Iowa league convention is well attended and practically all of the delegates made the trip to Keokuk.
