

DEATH OF HENRY ALLEN

Born in Pike County, Mo., and Had Been a Resident of Keokuk Since Beginning of Civil War.

Henry Allen, one of the old and respected colored citizens of Keokuk, died at 2:50 o'clock yesterday afternoon from a complication of diseases, the result of diabetes and heart trouble from which he had been a sufferer for many months. He had been confined to his bed since September 3.

He was born in Pike county, Missouri, about seventy-eight years ago, and came to Keokuk when a young man in 1861, the beginning of the civil war, and this city had been his home ever since. He had a large number of friends in the city both among the colored and white residents. He was quiet and courteous at all times, industrious and frugal. He was a hod carrier and probably worked some at plastering. He assisted in the erection of many of the substantial brick buildings of the city. He worked for a time regularly with George Hardesty and was at all times prompt and faithful, and his assistance was always appreciated by those for whom he worked. It will be with regret that the announcement of his death will be read.

He was twice married, his last union being with Mrs. Samantha Brown who survives him, with one step son John Wesley Brown. He is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Marie Johnson, of Chicago.

ONE OF DEER HERD ESCAPED FROM PARK

Animal Broke Out of Stockade Friday and is Being Hunted Throughout the City.

One of the herd of deer in Rand park zoo has escaped and is being hunted throughout the city. At last reports last night the deer was still at large. Yesterday morning the deer was being followed down High street by a crowd of boys.

Some of the youngsters were riding wheels, others were managing to keep up after the venison on foot, and the rear guard of the attacking party carried an air rifle.

Yesterday afternoon the deer got reckless and took the chance of being killed by an auto, as it raced down Fifth street. It escaped any such death, however.

The animal escaped, when William Raber, the park custodian, dragged the body of one of the herd which had died, outside the stockade. The animal had been sick and Mr. Raber was up with it most of the night Friday. When it finally succumbed, he dragged the body outside the fence, and the other animals became wild. One made a successful dash for liberty.
