

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SENATORS HAVE GONE TO BED

Thirty-one Hour Continuous Session Staged While Filibuster on River Bill is Staged.

CONFERENCES TODAY

Six Million Dollars Difference Between the Two Sides is the Cause of the Rumpus.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—A thirty-one hour continuous session, ending at six o'clock tonight proved to have been as much as the senate could stand and at the demand of rebellious senators who insisted that they would not be dragged from their beds tonight, the leaders in the fight for the rivers and harbors bill surrendered and permitted a recess until Monday morning. The limit was reached when just before six tonight, Senator Kenyon, having slept all afternoon, appeared as jauntily as could be, ready to take the floor and speak all night. Senator Norris, though scarcely recovered from his attack of lumbago, appeared on the scene ready to aid as much as he could which would certainly have been to the extent of making demands for a quorum every few minutes. Meanwhile the democrats realized Senator Burton was sleeping in his office, worn out by his all night speech and his work throughout the day. Altogether since six o'clock Friday night, Burton had occupied the floor about sixteen hours when he gave it up about four o'clock this afternoon to permit Senator Sterling to make a speech in favor of the bill.

Tomorrow a number of conferences will be held with a view of affecting a compromise on which the filibuster will end. Unless this is reached, the filibuster will be resumed with full force Monday. The opponents of the bill will be powerfully reinforced by Senator Borah who has been out of town and who is good for at least one all night or all day session, assisted by a few quorum calls. There are a number of senators, however, who are not willing to attend any more all night sessions and who have plainly warned those in charge of the bill to this effect, though they themselves favor the bill.

The difference between the two groups at present is about \$6,000,000. The committee bill as now amended appropriates about \$34,000,000, while the Burton substitute appropriation is about \$28,000,000. Burton took the committee substitute and merely scratched out a few items to which he particularly objected. It will be on these items that the conference will be held. President Wilson assured the democratic senators this afternoon that the report that he would favor a bill appropriating about \$13,000,000 in a lump sum, to be spent under the direction of the secretary of war, was absolutely unauthorized. Despite his assurance, there was a report among senators tonight, that the president had threatened to veto the bill unless it was materially cut down. The president was said to be in favor of a severe pruning of the bill as this would lessen the amount necessary to be raised by a war tax. Such an attitude on the part of the president, however, was not recognized as possible by the leaders in favor of the bill.

number of wage-earners 48,710 or 82.9 per cent were adult males; 9,420 or 16 per cent were adult females, and 664 or 1.1 per cent were young persons of both sexes under 15 years of age. The wages given are the rates per week for full time work. For convenience the following synopsis is given: Total number of wage-earners with per cent for each classified wage and also showing aggregate number with per cent of total receiving below stipulated rate.

Days in Operation. Table V gives the average number of days in operation of each classified list of industries. It shows the average for all of the 1,325 establishments reporting to be 283.5 days and as the working days of the year, exclusive of Sundays and holidays are 305, it shows an average loss of only 22.5 days. This average is, however, slightly increased by reason of a number of establishments working seven days of the week. The industries reporting the greatest number of working days of the year are illuminating gas

Of the 48,710 adult males employed, 4,979 or 10.1 per cent earn under \$10 per week; 12,313 or 25.1 per cent earn under \$12 per week; 29,702 or 68.8 per cent earn under \$15 per week. Of the 9,420 adult females, 7,849 or 83.4 per cent receive less than \$10 per week; 8,670 or 92.1 per cent receive less than \$12 per week, and 9,147 or 97.1 per cent receive less than \$15 per week. Of the 664 young persons under 16 years of age 266 or 40.1 per cent receive less than \$5 per week; 412 or

and electric light operating every day of the year and that of cement which reported 340.1 days of operation. The canning industry—a distinctly seasonal industry—averaged but 68.8 days. Artificial stone and brick and tile, two other generally considered seasonal industries average 216.6 and 217.4 respectively. A fairly accurate computation of the annual earning capacity in each occupation can be made from table IV giving classified wage rates and table V giving the average days of operation of the several industries.
