LARGE DELEGATION ATTENDS FUNERAL

Keokuk Lawyers Want to Fort Madison This Morning to Pay Last Tribute to J. D. M. Hamilton's Memory.

FUNERAL IMPRESSIVE

Services Were Held at Portico of Lee County Court House—Tributes Paid by Fort Madison Bar.

A large delegation from the Keokuk Bar association went to Fort Madison this morning to attend the funeral this afternoon at 12:30 o'clock of the late J. D. M. Hamilton. The members of the Keokuk bar decided at the memorial meeting on Monday that they would go, as many as could, to the funeral. Services were held this afternoon at 12:30 o'clock from the portico of the Lee county court house.

Out of respect to the memory of both J. D. M. Hamilton and Sabret T. Marshall, court was adjourned at Fort Madison yesterday and today. Fort Madison honored the memory of its former mayor by turning out en masse for the services, and all city business was halted, and the mayor and councilmen attended the services.

The Fort Madison Democrat contains the following concerning the tributes paid there to the memory of Mr. Hamilton and Sabret T. Marshall: Organizations representative of the entire city of Fort Madison in sessions or announcements of today and yesterday paid tribute to the memory of the late J. D. M. Hamilton whose funeral occurs here tomorrow.

In a communication to the Evening Democrat, W. I. Gabbert says: "Referring to finding recently of a skeleton on the sand bar opposite the Taber mill at Keokuk, I went to Keokuk Friday last and made close examinations of the skeleton and the things found attached to it and I say positively it is not the remains of my son, Otis T. Gabbert. That surely is a plainly worded statement. There is a space in my cemetery holdings at Fort Madison, the Elmwood, for Otis' remains when recovered. The stone is already up. I have been quoted as saying the remains found were those of my son when I have from start to finish and still emphatically say it is not my son."

Fort Madison Bar. A meeting of the bar of Fort Madison, Lee county, Iowa, was held at the court house at Fort Madison September 22, 1914, at 10 o'clock a. m. Judge Henry Bank, Jr., presided. Omar E. Herminghaus acted as secretary.

The death of Honorable J. D. M. Hamilton and the death of Honorable Sabret T. Marshall, both members of the Lee county bar, was announced by Judge Bank.

H. C. Stempel, T. B. Snyder, O. C. Herminghaus, J. R. Fralley and J. L. Benbow were appointed as a committee to draft resolutions of respect in regard to the late Honorable J. D. M. Hamilton and also in regard to the late Honorable Sabret T. Marshall, and they were instructed to report such resolutions to a meeting of the bar to be held Saturday, September 26, 1914, at 9:30 o'clock a. m.

It was arranged that the members of the bar attend the funeral of the Hon. J. D. M. Hamilton in a body. J. R. Fralley was appointed as a committee of one to secure flowers.

The court adjourned this day and also September 23, 1914, out of respect to the Honorable J. D. M. Hamilton and the Honorable Sabret T. Marshall.

Topeka's Tribute. Topeka, Kansas, Journal, Sept. 21: As the advocate of "Safety First," Mr. Hamilton was perhaps best known. With the safety department of the system, he created the "Get the Safety Habit" movement to perfection. He brought that campaign out of its infancy until now it is an important factor in the management of the road.

The flag on the staff of the general office building is at half mast and the building is appropriately draped. "The death of Mr. Hamilton was a great shock to his fellow-officials in the Santa Fe office building," a Santa Fe man said this morning. "A man of portly build and full of life, Mr. Hamilton appeared to be in the best of health. Nobody ever thought of him as nearing the end of his earthly career. Pleasant and agreeable in the transaction of business, always on hand to do his share of any duty to be performed, full of sympathy for those in trouble, yet a good laugh, and ready to give or take a joke, Mr. Hamilton endeared himself to his associates and, on account of the fatherly interest he took in younger men,

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
