SAYS HE WAS HELD UP TO EXHIBIT FIRST LAMP

Assailants Had Gagged Him and His Feet and Hands Were Tied So He Couldn't Move.

FORT MADISON, Sept. 26.—Friday afternoon Lawrence Gregg, son of Walter Gregg, who lives on the cross road between the Augusta and Burlington roads a few miles north of Fort Madison, went across the farm to get some tools from a disc.

He says he was coming from the farm of Waldo Gregg to his employer's home about 11 a. m., and was taking a short cut through the timber. When about half way between the places a couple of masked men leaped out of the woods, one in front of him and one behind him and pointing a gun at his head commanded him to "halt."

EDISON DAY TO BE CELEBRATED

October 21 is Thirty-fifth Anniversary of Edison's First Incandescent Electric Lamp.

TO EXHIBIT FIRST LAMP

Local Schools Will be Asked to Observe the Day in Honor of the Wizard of Menlo Park.

October 21 will be celebrated all over the United States as "Edison Day." It will mark the 35th anniversary of Edison's first incandescent lamp.

The movement is being started by one of the largest electrical companies in the country. Primarily, it was intended by this company to be the basis of a monster advertising campaign.

One of the interesting features of the day will be the exhibition of a replica of Edison's first incandescent lamp, of 60 watts, 16 candle power. It will first be placed on exhibition in the office windows of a local electric company.

An effort to have the local schools make some observance of the day will be made. A lecture on Edison's life and work will be submitted to the schools. Photographs and posters bearing his likeness will also be shown prominently in many places in the city.
