His mother died and was buried last Sunday and he has been unable to rest, and Friday his mind seemed to be affected. He has always been an industrious and extremely prosperous farmer, having accumulated several hundred acres of land and has his land well stocked. He is married and has one child. His many friends wish him speedy and complete recovery.
