The Mexican Muddle. WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—If the Villa-Carranza peace conference today at Zacatecas is unable immediately to settle the dispute of the two chieftains, constitutionalists here declared Carranza had an alternative proposition—Institution of an armistice—to prevent further bloodshed in the new rebellion, pending further negotiations.

Great confidence that the Zacatecas meeting will result in the retirement of Carranza as first chief and an agreement to make Fernando Iglesias Calderon provisional president, was expected today in diplomatic, official and constitutionalist circles.

He has some perfectly fascinating plans for basketball and indoor baseball leagues among the Sunday school, day schools and college boys, which will speedily be worked out. He also has laid plans for the organization of the whole boydom of the town in the boy scout movement with a patrol in each Sunday school. Camp fire girls will be inaugurated by a committee from the Civic league under Mr. Haradon's direction. Boys' camp meetings will be held Sunday afternoons.

Mr. Haradon will teach calisthenics in the public schools and will supervise the play at recess time.

Carthage is not selfish with this work but invites boys from the country within a radius of ten miles to join the membership and all its privileges.

Mr. Haradon will meet the young women of Carthage interested in forming a class in gymnasium work at the Y. M. C. A. rooms Tuesday afternoon and perfect such an organization if it is desired.
