

Nearly One-Fourth of Desired \$10,000 Has Been Subscribed

Committees of the Industrial Association Have Marked Success During First Afternoon of Their Campaign

Twenty-three hundred and forty-seven dollars was the amount raised yesterday by the solicitors during the afternoon's campaign for membership in the Industrial Association. This is a magnificent showing for the first day out. It indicates enthusiasm on the part of the people of Keokuk and abundant faith in its future.

A very good idea of the feeling of the general public toward the Association is found in the enthusiasm with which the campaign committees have been received. The new plan of organization appeals to all alike and the statement was made that with the system in force the Association should be able to accomplish more easily, and with much less burden upon the people of Keokuk, the object for which it is formed.

A large committee of the business men of Keokuk met at the E K's Club yesterday noon and planned the campaign. Immediately after

lunch the districts were assigned, the facts concerning the Association were given out and the committee started.

The work continued the larger part of the afternoon and was exceptionally successful. There was considerable enthusiasm on the part of those seen, for the future of the city as planned by the Association and an unbounded faith in the future of Keokuk as a city of importance in the central west.

A number of people were absent from their places of business and could not be seen on the first trip. However, the work will continue until the entire field is covered. Not a man will be missed. The Board of Directors is trying to make a thorough job of the canvass this year as it did previously and is sparing no effort in making it a success.

Ten thousand dollars is the amount needed and every effort will be made to secure the

entire amount to carry out the plan of campaign in detail. The first day was a success. The effort will be continued and every man lined up for the coming year. The Association is not asking for as much as it did previously because the primary expense has been covered.

The American Cement Machine Co., brought here just a year ago, is in splendid condition and has made a wonderful success of its first year's business. The enlargement of its factory equipment and storage give full evidence of the success of the industry.

The Johnson Electric Smelter is an accomplished fact, for Keokuk. The machinery is here. The man in charge of the machinery and equipment is here and is looking over the ground preparatory to starting work on the plant. The first ten-ton units of the smelter will be located on the property of the Mississippi River Power Co., just below the Garmo plant. The permanent location will be determined later although it is practically settled where the permanent plant will be.

GALESBURG MAN INDICTED AGAIN

This Will Make Third One Returned Against Dr. George E. Maley for Alleged Violation of the Mann Act.

DEMURRER OVERRULED

Trial is Ordered Begun This Afternoon at 1:30 o'clock—Court Officials Visit Power Plant.

Overruling the demurrer presented by his attorneys to third indictment against Dr. George E. Maley, charged with violating the Mann act, Judge Van Valkenburgh in the federal court, set the trial of Maley for this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. Maley was indicted by the grand jury yesterday afternoon. This makes the third indictment against him. The arguments in the demurrer were made this morning and promptly overruled by the court.

The demurrer to the indictment is based on the grounds that it alleges three separate and distinct offenses in the same indictment. It is claimed that it is not sufficient to compel the defendant to plead, and that it is bad for duplicity and charges more than one offense.

LOCAL COMPANY IS BEING SUED

Everett Manufacturing Co. Asking Judgment of \$550 from James Cameron Sons.

The Everett Manufacturing company has filed suit in the district court against James Cameron's Sons, asking judgment for \$550. According to the petition the company shipped to Scott Madden Iron Works some portable dumping boxes to be placed on wagons for dumping dirt, coal, etc. These were to have been sold by the Scott Madden company. It is alleged in the petition that these boxes were stored with Cameron's, and that the storage company used eleven for their own work. It is alleged that the Scott Madden company was indebted to defendants in suit, and that these boxes were taken only for the purpose of allowing a credit of \$550. It is claimed that the boxes were to have been sold only on consignment and that the Scott Madden company had no right or authority to do this. Judgment is asked for in the amount of \$550, the value of the dumping boxes, it is alleged in the petition.

Y. M. C. A. ITEMS; SWIMMING MEETS

Physical Committee of Boys' Department to Conduct a Series of Swimming Contest.

An Appropriate Trophy to be Awarded to the School Scoring Largest Number of Points.

The physical work committee of the Y. M. C. A. boys' department will conduct a series of swimming meets to determine the swimming championship of the grade schools in the city.

Three meets will be held. Two preliminary meets—the first, Saturday evening, October 24, at 7:30 o'clock, Garfield, Washington, Torrence and St. Mary's schools competing; the second, Saturday evening, October 31, at 7:30 o'clock, Lincoln, Wells, Carey and St. Peter's schools competing. The winners in the preliminary meets will compete in a final meet to determine the championship on Saturday, November 7.

An appropriate trophy will be awarded the school scoring the highest number of points. Awards will be given boys winning first three places in any event in final meet and to boys winning first three places in highest individual score in any of the three meets. Any boy who is in grade school and is ten years of age or over and can swim, may enter the meet. An entrance fee of ten cents is charged and must be paid when entry blank is signed. Each boy is required to enter with the school of which he is a member and must furnish his own swimming trunks or suit. The preliminary meets will consist of the following events: Plunge for distance. 50 foot dash. 50 yard swim. Neat dive (running and standing). Under water swim. Relay race (four lengths, four boys). A boy may enter one or more of the events. Entrance blanks may be ob-
