#### REPLY TO MAJ. COLLINS

To the Editor of The Gate City: Major Collins in an article published in Friday's Gate City, apologizes for the enormous expenses of the district court, as shown by the last report of the county auditor, and tries to figure out that the legitimate expenses of the district court should be \$9,222.97. Will he please explain to the voters of Lee county why the district court expenses, as given on pages 43 and 44 of the County Auditor's report for 1913 as \$23,197.02 (expenses controlled largely by the judge) should be that large amount, while Clinton county with a population of 45,394 as against Lee county's population of 36,702 for the identical item is only \$6148.55 for 1913? Let him explain why Des Moines county with a population of 36,145 should have a district court expense of only \$7,488.03 against Lee county's expense of \$23,197.02. Let him explain why the court expenses of 1913 should jump from \$15,899.57 in 1912 to \$23,197.02 in 1913, or an increase of \$7,297.45 in one year. Let him explain why Judge Bank is not responsible for the expense of \$2,198.00 for May and June, 1914, when he assigned on May 4, twenty-seven jury cases for trial and when the jury came on May 11, he did not begin a trial until about the 18th, and then tried only three jury cases between that date and the thirtieth of June. A jury fee of \$6.00 is all that can be charged to a litigant as costs, the balance of the jury expenses are paid by the county, and it costs from \$100 to \$200 per day to keep a jury waiting for lawyers to get ready to try their cases. Is it not the judge's business to keep the jury working while they are present in court, and is it not the duty and business of lawyers to be ready to try their cases, and the judge's business to see that they are ready, or dismiss their cases, if they do not get ready? I have been in court and seen how the time was wasted by reason of the court's not requiring lawyers to be ready. I have seen the court at the May term held by Judge Bank, work the jury for only four hours. No farmer would think of working only four hours a day. Court would begin at 9:30 o'clock and take one-half hours recess and adjourn at 11:30, until 2:00 o'clock, take a half hour's recess in the afternoon and adjourn for the day at 4:30 o'clock. With court run that way, with a jury present, is it any wonder that the expenses are so enormous? Does a large tax payer like Major Collins think, in the face of the comparison with Des Moines and Clinton counties, that the courts of this county are the most economically administered courts of the state? We assert without fear of successful contradiction that the court expenses could be reduced without materially affecting their efficiency, and we further say that it is our opinion that if more economical methods were adopted by the judges, the courts would be more efficient and more satisfactory to the public and to the lawyers.

#### TWO DAYS FOR BUNDLES

Only Short Time Remains if Packages Are to be Gotten into Main Shipment From Here Saturday.

Packages for the Christmas ship are coming in liberally. See that they are plainly marked for the Christmas ship. These packages will be made up into one shipment Saturday and sent to the navy yard at Brooklyn where the collier Jason is waiting to receive them and store them in her hold. The Jason will go across the seas, with a white flag and the Stars and Stripes flying, and will be the messenger of peace on earth to the children of Europe.

Santa Claus will come to Europe in spite of the carnage of war. The thoughtfulness of America can not soon be forgotten.

Many there are who can remember the sad Christmases of the rebellion. Is not that memory enough to urge you to tell your children and grandchildren the story of the Christmas ship, and to help them choose what they shall send? #### DEATH OF A VETERAN; I. K. GALLOUPE

Died at the Family Residence, 508 Palean Street—Funeral at Residence Tomorrow Afternoon.

The death of J. K. Galloupe, an old and respected resident of Keokuk and a veteran of the civil war, occurred at his residence, 508 Palean street, at 4:20 o'clock yesterday afternoon after a long period of ill health, of brain disease, and symptoms of paralysis. He had been ill in bed about seven weeks.

Mr. Galloupe was born at Portsmouth, Ohio, December 11, 1845, where he spent his boyhood days and in March, 1866, was married at Fairmont, Mo., to Miss Henrietta Dunlap, a popular young lady of that vicinity. About twenty-five years ago they came to Keokuk to reside which has since been their home.

Comrade Galloupe enlisted during the civil war in company B, Third Iowa cavalry and made an enviable record as a soldier. He was reared in the christian faith, and was of a kindly disposition, genial with friends and courteous to everybody. He served seventeen years as night watchman with the Irwin-Phillips company, and performed his duties promptly and faithfully, but his health failed and he was forced to retire from the active duties which the position required.

He is survived by his wife, the three children born to them having preceded him in death. He is also survived by one brother, Frank Galloupe, who is also a veteran of the civil war, and is now at the soldiers' home at Quincy. He has been notified of his brother's death, but it is feared that infirmities may prevent his coming to Keokuk.

The funeral is to be held at the residence, 508 Palean street, at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The burial will be private.

### Y. M. C. A. CLASSES TO BE FORMED

In the Department of Engineering Extension, Iowa State College—Many Educational Branches.

#### THE BOYS ARE ACTIVE

Physical Activities Progressing—Boys' Hike Across the River to be Enjoyed Saturday.

The engineering extension classes which have heretofore been mentioned, with the various classes to be formed, are becoming popular throughout the state. These classes are in co-operation with the public schools, trade organizations, Y. M. C. A. and manufacturing firms. They are under the supervision of the department of engineering extension of the Iowa state college at Ames, Iowa, which bears a greater part of the expense, aside from text books and the like.

It is given out that engineering extension in Iowa means the education of "the man on the job." In developing this work Iowa state college desires so far as possible to work through existing agencies and thus avoid duplication. There are three plans presented by the college, plans Nos. 1, 2 and 3. The classes here will organize under plan No. 2, which provides for a term of twenty weeks, twenty-four meetings.

All material and instruction is furnished and paid for by the department of engineering extension, except drawing instruments and text books for advanced course. During the course there will be five lectures given by capable men from the college.

In addition to the classes already named in these columns, there will be a class on salesmanship. The intention is to give every young man or boy a chance for an education in the essential branches of education, such as will prove an absolute necessity in the successful pursuit of his calling, and will be indeed the realization of a long felt want. Boys and men in shops and stores and in all kinds of commercial pursuits will have an opportunity to acquire an education, "while they wait." Their spare time may be utilized in studying instead of idleness.
