CARS THIS WEEK OVER NEW LINE

Construction of Street Car Line Extension on McKinley Avenue is Nearly Completed.

ALL TRACK IS READY

Only a Few Days Will be Required to String Trolley Line—Work on Water Main Extension.

Unless something unforeseen delays, the operation of cars on the new McKinley avenue extension will be started some time this week. With the return of Manager Ingle from the east, the work will be rushed through after tomorrow and it is thought can be completed in a few days.

All the track has now been laid from Nineteenth street to the end of the extension, and all but a small distance of the line has been filled in between the ties. Practically all that remains to be done is to string the trolley wire.

The poles on each side of the street that will carry the electric light and trolley wires have been set and the span wires for the trolley already are in place. The current will be carried in on a line that runs into McKinley avenue from about Twenty-first street. This line already is completed. All that is now necessary is to string the trolley line which will require but two or three days under favorable weather conditions. The extension of the electric light wires will also be finished in a few days.

The water works company now has a large force of men at work laying the six inch main that will run to the end of the extension to connect with all houses that are being constructed or that already are completed in this new residence district. Several blocks of the trench has been excavated and the pipes are being placed in position. It is hoped that gas mains will be extended to this district early next summer, and this may be done, according to officials of the Keokuk Electric company.

The fine chicken dinner served by the ladies of the M. E. church was well attended last week. These ladies are fine cooks and their dinners are always well patronized.


The new 600 club was entertained Friday night at Mr. Ed Hosford's home, Miss Daisy Hosford as hostess.
