

Diary of the War

Sunday, Oct. 25.
German troops, who crossed the Yser river between Neuport and Dixmude hold their advantage. Allies are heavily reinforced northeast of Ypres where the Germans report an advance. Russians claim they defeated German rear guard covering retreat along Skervaka river. Berlin announces its U-9, which sank the Hawke, is the same submarine that sank the Aboukir, Cressy and Hogue.

Monday, Oct. 26.
French war office asserts German forces that crossed the Yser has been unable to advance. German heavy land guns force British fleet to move back from Belgium coast line. Austrian government announces Austro-German front extends in a straight line from San river to Plock. Berlin officially announces Gen. Von Moltke, chief of the general staff, has temporarily retired, owing to liver and gall stones attack. General Von Falkenhayn succeeded him.

Tuesday, Oct. 27.
French war office asserts allies advanced south of Dixmude. Germans along frontier are driven into their own territory near Nancy. General DeWet and Beyers mutinied and attempt to organize British revolt in British South Africa. German troops invade Portuguese province of Angola. West Africa, according to Lisbon reports. Petrograd states Germans have been driven back seventy-five miles west of Warsaw. Italy lands force in Albania, ostensibly for sanitary work.

Wednesday, Oct. 28.
French war office announces German attack in western Belgium are moderating. Petrograd states attempts to relieve the German situation in Poland by diversions from the north are failing. Germans claim to be making progress southwest of Lille and near Ypres. General Botha routs a rebellious command under General Beyers in South Africa.

Thursday, Oct. 29.
Allies claim to have captured German trenches between Aisne river and Argonne. German aeroplanes drop bombs over Dunkirk, killing woman and child. Turkey begins war on Russia by bombarding Black sea ports and sinking Russian gunboat. German cruiser Emden enters harbor of Penang, disguised as Japanese warship and sinks Russian cruiser Shemchug and French destroyer and escapes. Prince Louis of Battenberg, first sea lord of the British admiralty, is forced to resign because he was born in Austria and is only a naturalized Briton.

Friday, Oct. 30.
Turkish cavalry reported moving toward Sinai peninsula for possible reconnaissance in Egypt. Belgians flood lower valley of Yser river, compelling Germans to withdraw. German troops advance to Neuport. Indian reports join Japanese army before Tsing Tao. Admiral Lord Fisher succeeded Prince Battenberg as first sea lord of the British admiralty.

Saturday, Oct. 31.
French government begins planning to return to Paris Nov. 20. German war office states that at no point on either front is the conflict approaching a decisive state. Austria announced total capture of 73,819 Russians. French government reports gains along the southern battle front and says German assaults north of Arras were repulsed at heavy loss.

Big Wheat Order.
[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—The J. Rosenbaum Grain company of Chicago, today received an order for four million bushel of wheat for export, perhaps the largest export order ever given a single firm. The order came from the exporting house of Dreyfus & Co., of New York and Paris. Owing to the fact that the November shipment must be guaranteed, the Rosenbaum company was unable to fill the order. Officials of the company declared at least 14,000,000 bushels of wheat will be exported from New Orleans and Galveston in November and that they would be unable to find vessel room for 4,000,000 more.

Horse Sense.
[United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Stricken as he drove along a street crowded with speeding autos and delivery vans, Edward Rathje, sixty years old, a milk wagon driver, was taken to safety by his horse "Baldy." With Rathje moaning and wondering why everything had turned black, the horse jogged safely from the path of autos and to the curbstone where he stopped near a policeman. "Hey, are you asleep?" yelled the policeman at Rathje. "No, I've gone blind," answered the aged man. As he was being taken to a hospital, Rathje's last words to the policeman were: "Take care of Baldy."

Business District Burned.
[United Press Leased Wire Service.] BRONSON, Texas, Oct. 31.—The business district of this place, fifteen buildings, occupying three blocks, was wiped out by fire of unknown origin today. Fire last spring destroyed nineteen stores, and today's blaze wiped out the remainder. The post-office, hotel and telephone exchange were burned. Today's fire started in the Lowe hotel.

Denies Being a Spy.
[United Press Leased Wire Service.] LONDON, Oct. 31.—Carl Hans Lody, who is on trial as a spy before the military court, Lord Chylesmore presiding, in Middlesex Guildhall, took the stand in his own defense late today. Lody formerly lived in Omaha, Neb., and it is alleged that he had passed himself off as an American and had sent valuable military information to Germany.

The accused stated that he formally was a senior lieutenant in the German navy, but that he was finally transferred to the reserve and obtained a position as a tourist agent of the Hamburg American line. Last July, while in Berlin, Lody stated, he was ordered by a superior naval officer to select a route to New York. First he was to proceed to London and wait until the first naval battle, when he was to send details of the actual losses of the British fleet. He was then to proceed to New York. Lody declared that while his instructions were to keep track of the British fleet, he was directed not to do any spying. He said that his instructions caused him uneasiness, but that he was assured by his superior officer

that he had sufficiently the appearance of an American, not to be suspected of being a German.
He insisted that he had not at any time acted as a spy and denied he had sent any reports regarding armaments of the British fleet or of the British naval bases to Berlin. He stated that he lived in America a long time and was married two years ago there to an American woman of German descent. The matrimonial venture proved a failure and his father-in-law paid him \$10,000 to permit his wife to get a divorce.

To Revive Ferns.
Nitrate of soda dissolved in water should be given to ferns that are small or weak one-quarter of an ounce of nitrate to a gallon of water. One-half an ounce of nitrate to a gallon of water should be used on plants that are large and vigorous. Soot and salt are also good to use occasionally.

Warships for China.
When the Creditanstalt, the Es-komptebank, and the Laenderbank subscribed a portion of the Chinese loan to the amount of £1,500,000 (\$7,299,750) in 6 per cent bonds, it was agreed that the Chinese government should favor Austrian industries with orders for ships. In compliance with this agreement, the construction of three Chinese cruisers has been ordered, which will be built at Monfalcone, near Trieste. The cruisers will cost 10,000,000 crowns (\$2,030,000). It is reported that some of the machinery will be constructed in Bohemian factories.
