The War at a Glance

Summarized by John Edwin Nevin, United Press Staff Correspondent.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] ENGLAND—Reports that German squadrons are attempting to attack the English coast on the North sea and the Russian coast towns on the Baltic and gulf of Finland persist, but the government refuses to confirm them.

FRANCE—The Germans continue their attacks in force between the Lys and Arras with alternate advances and retirements on both sides. The fighting is admittedly desperate, but the battle is still far from a decision.

GERMANY—Berlin hears that the railway between Bulgaria and Serbia has been cut and claims that this means Bulgaria will aid Turkey in the war. It is claimed that the Germans are advancing near Vres and have taken additional prisoners. The Germans are also said to be advancing near Verdun.

JAPAN—The war office declares that fort Iliu at Tsing Tao has been silenced and confirms the report that the Austrian cruiser Kaiserin Elizabeth has been sunk.

What the War Moves Mean

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, Nov. 4. (11 a. m.)—The admission by the British war office that the London Scottish regiment is now on the firing line in Belgium, means the immense reserve strength of the British empire is coming into effective use.

The London Scottish is the first territorial regiment that has joined the British expeditionary force on the continent. The territorial army of England corresponds to America's national guard.

When war broke out, Lord Kitchener declined to rush the territorials to the continent, although the need for men was very great. He decided that the army needed several months continuous training. This change in developments in the conflict has been regarded as a decisive one for German hopes.

If the German general staff could not secure a great victory before British reserve strength began to appear, the advantage the allies would possess has seemed to be unmistakable. No such victory has been gained and the first British territorial regiment has arrived at the front.

The defeat of three British cruisers and a supply ship by five German cruisers off the Chilean coast, demonstrates the hopelessness of a greatly inferior force attacking a superior power at sea.

The German preponderance in the Chilean battle is not adequately represented by the proportion of five to three. The German heavy armament aggregated sixteen 8-3 inch guns, 12 5-9 inch guns and 30 one inch guns. British vessels had 9 two inch guns and 32 six inch guns.

With anything like equal efficiency, this difference in armament particularly that between 16 6-2 inch rifles and 9 9-2 inch guns must have resulted in success for the Germans. Chief credit for the victory is in the naval strategy that brought it about.
