The Warsaw Gate City

Warsaw, Ill., Nov. 5, 1914.

A number of Warsaw men attended the first men's meeting of the season at Hamilton. The chairman, Mayor Barber, in his opening address referred to the success of the institute of public men's meetings in Warsaw, which has encouraged the Hamilton men to take up the work in their city. Mr. M. P. Berry of Carthage then delivered a thoughtful and helpful address on the subject, "Strong Men." Mr. Berry congratulated the Hamilton men to their institution of regular men's meetings, because these meetings have the purpose to make better

men. Mr. Berry then said in part: "The power man can exercise and develop is threefold—physical, intellectual and moral or spiritual. We know how to get physical and intellectual power. But physical and intellectual strength makes only half a man. The moral or spiritual nature of man is governed by the same law as the physical and intellectual nature. As every plant must have its proper environment, so the physical, intellectual and spiritual nature of man needs the proper environment. The right environment of the spiritual nature of man is God, and the longing of man should be: 'As the heart panteth after the water breaks, so panteth my soul after thee, O God.' And the answer to this craving for spiritual power will be: 'My strength is sufficient for thee.'" The discussion, which was listened to with great attention by the well attended meeting, lasted for one and one-half hours, in which ten speakers of Hamilton and Warsaw participated, namely: Mr. Arthur, Rev. N. Hall, Mayor Barber, M. P. Berry, Rev. E. H. Jactstein, C. F. Kopp, L. Jackson, A. Blesner, G. Gallier and J. N. Horsford.
